Bryan Comes Forth With a :: Move Calling for Forgetting of War Debts

PEACE WOULD RESULT :

Would Make World Disarmament Price to be Paid for Complete Cancellation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.-The war debts of the world, especially those owed the United States by the Turopean countries, which total over \$6,000,000,000 are the dangerous and poisonous ingredients which are now being stirred up into a pottage of hate that will lead to another and far more terrible war than the late one, unless the United States assumes the moral leadership of world affairs and exchanges its "worthless and never-to-be-collected debts for priceless peace."

That is the opinion of William Jennings Bryan, leader of the Democratic party and great advocate of world peace, who came forth today in a speech before an audience which contained a number of members of both Senate and House of Representatives. Bryan advocated out and out cancellation of the debts, declaring that such a move would leave France and the other countries who now owe America free to rehabilitate themselves, and that with these countries back on their feet, our added business relations caused by the friendship engendered by the cancellation move would soon net us far more than the money now owed us. In addition, Bryan declared, the cancellation of the debts would practically mean our immunity from future wars because of the friendship which the move would certainly bring.

The Commoner Saturday morning talked the matter over with President Coolidge, but neither Bryan nor the President would make any comment upon their conference. Bryan was closeted with the chief executive for over an hour.

Bryan, in his speech today, declared he would make world disarmament the price of the unparalleled generosity on the part of the United States, claiming that the nations of the world would gladly do away with their fighting forces should the United States see fit to cancel the debt. This move would give the war stricken countries an opportunity to rehabiliate themselves more rapidly for thousands of men would be released from military service and enabled to take up work in building up their coun-

Southern Pacific Lines Are Greatly Reducing Crossing Accidents

Reports just completed for the year 1924 show that grade crossing accidents per 1000 registered automobiles were reduced on the Southern Pacific to 22 or 17 per cent with a reduction of 30 or 14 talities compared with the year 1923, even in the face of a large increase in the number of registered automobiles in 1924 over

Fatalities at grade drossings were reduced 3 or 99 per cent per 1,000,000 locomotives miles. The department of safety of the Southern Pacific attributes this good showing to efforts of the press and automobile associations.

Public schools and the Southern Pacific own safety organization, comprising officers and employes, in the matter of educating automobile drivers in safe practices on approaching and crossing railroad tracks. Reports received during the year indicate a large increase in number of drivers stopping before crossing track which no doubt had much to do with making this good record.

The situation in this respect was also aided by legislation and sions requiring school busses and trucks containing explosives or inflamable liquids to stop before crossing tracks.
