BRITAIN PROPOSES BIG SUBSIDIES FOR PRIVATE AVIATION

LONDON, Jan. 26. — Great Britain is proposing subsidies for private flying.

"Getting the nation used to the air is one of the aims of the present government of Great Britain," said Samuel Hoare, Secretary of State for Air, in an interview. "In order to do this, in my estimates next Spring, I shall make proposals for the encouragement of light aeroplane flying clubs."

The present proposals of Sir Samuel are as follows: A government grant of \$50,000 for every light aeroplane club, for equipment.

All clubs receiving government grants shall meet the requirements of the Air Ministry.

A government grant of \$50 for every member of one of these approved clubs who qualifies for an air license.

"Such a plan will be of great assistance in the development of both military and civil aviation," Sir Samuel said. "It will widen the field for the creation of reserve pilots, and it will get the nation used to the air and will encourage the use of civil air routes."

The new British government has no plans for any great change in air policy, according to Sir Samuel, but it will carry on the policy of gradual expansion which has been in force for the past eighteen months, and which the Labor government supported.

This program aims particularly at the creation of a large home defense air force. The program calls for fifty-two aeroplanes. At present eighteen of these squadrons are in service and the remainder will go into commission within the next two years. It is also planned to create five squadrons of volunteer home defense forces. To further the plan for defense air forces Sir John Salmon has been created as Commander of Home Defense for Air and took up his duties January 1.

Sir Samuel stated that the government will continue a vigorous policy for the development of civil aviation and extension of British air routes.

"It is my earnest hope that within a short time the British routes to Europe will be extended to Prague," said Sir Samuel. "Prague is the center of Europe and it is a key point and we are hopeful that small difficulties in the way of such an extension will soon be wiped out."

"Always in the back of my mind there is the aim of a British air route to the colonies and the dominions. An imperial air-route to India, and even to Australia, is a big project, but I am not without hopes that within three or four years we will have accomplished this great task. I regard that as the big project before the Air Ministry. It will have a great effect upon the strengthening of the Empire. It will aid trade, of course, and it will also strengthen the bond between the Dominions and the central government. It will bring dominion officials into

closer touch with home officials and will make understanding easier.

"I am gratified that my predecessors did not make any drastic change in our air policy. It is my view that an air policy is a matter for gradual development and continuity. I hope that in the future we shall continue to keep our air policy free from party issues, and I see no reason now why we cannot do that."

"There is nothing sensational in our air policy, but it is a policy of constant growth and development. It will need the support of the nation and we aim to get the nation used to the air."

OREGON CITIES NOW JOINED BY LEAGUE

PORTLAND, Jan. 26. — The League of Oregon Municipalities came into existence here Saturday at a meeting attended by representatives of 26 towns of the state. Its purpose is to work for co-operation for the mutual interests of towns of Oregon and to endeavor to obtain the passage of an amendment to the state constitution providing municipalities with the principals of "home rule" in all matters pertaining explicitly to home government.

PRINTER MISTAKE STOPS BILL VOTE
