Health Hints by the Father of Physical Culture

I have met many people who have found how to get along best on two meals a day, and I have met not a few who find one meal a day meets their requirements. The good rule to follow in this regard is to eat only when you are hungry. One of the greatest errors in this regard is to feel that one must eat by the clock—at certain hours. When one is not hungry enough to really enjoy his meal he cannot, as a matter of fact, completely digest that meal for the reason that desire or appetite has an effect on the secretions of gastric and other digestive juices. There is considerable science in the idea that the desires and emotions increase or decrease the flow, and quality of the digestive juices. One should never eat when angry, worried or grieved. By the same token it must be evident also that cheerfulness and laughter at the table aid digestion and that a dyspeptic should not only study to acquire for himself a healthful mental attitude, but should seek the companionship of cheerful persons while eating.

To drink a cupful of hot water in the morning on arising aids considerably in cleansing the stomach and bowels of effete matter that has accumulated over night.

The use of drugs, cathartics, pepsin from a pig's stomach, or rennet from a calf's stomach, producing an unnatural vitality is in itself a frequent cause of stomach and bowel trouble and their continued use is often responsible for an acute condition becoming chronic. The fact is certainly significant that dyspeptics who will keep on trying this and that patent medicine or other artificial stimulant become confirmed dyspeptics. Their condition usually grows worse instead of better, and the result is a complete breakdown.

The best treatment for stomach and bowel trouble is, after all, any course that will build up one's vitality and general health in a natural way. As such a regimen improves the circulation, the organs of secretion and digestion must perform their functions more naturally, and the blood itself must carry nutrition to every part of the body.

To produce an evacuation of the bowels, an injection of warm water is recommended, the warm water injection to be followed by cold water.

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Many cases of chronic monoxide poisoning, he said, can be traced to the automobile traffic in large cities.

"The carbon monoxide," continued Dr. Shumway, "is without odor, color or taste, and its presence is therefore frequently unsuspected. The gas, when once in the human system, stops the work of oxygen in the body.

"The most common symptoms, aside from headaches and nausea, are loss of appetite, anaemia and a reduction of the number of red blood cells, dizziness, general fatigue, dryness of the throat, irritation, watering of the eyes, and lack of mental concentration. Later changes in the mental state may occur, such as loss of will power, lack of decision, restlessness, irritability on the slightest discomfort, and insomnia.

"Many examinations of the air have been made, in connection with calculations of the amount of carbon monoxide which can safely be breathed. This was done in drawing up plans for the construction of the vehicular traffic tube connecting New York City and New Jersey. The tests showed the exhaust gases of gasoline automobiles contain from 4 to 12 per cent of carbon monoxide."

Dr. Shumway suggested that legislation be enacted to change the position of the automobile exhaust. Make a law, he said, that will require an additional license fee from car owners hav-
