Klamath Indian Is Murdered by Two Companions

KLAMATH FALLS, Jan. 29.—One Klamath Indian is dead from knife wounds and two more of his fellow tribesmen are held at Yreka, Cal., on murder charges as a result of drinking liquor, according to long distance reports received here. The slain Indian is Willy Harry, 25, married and the father of two children. Those held for his slaying are Chester Pepper, 31, and Harry Jerry, 18. The tragedy occurred in a lonely cabin on the banks of the Klamath river, over the California border, in the little settlement of Tea Bar, last Wednesday night.

SENSATIONAL EVIDENCE OUT AGAINST PROHIBITION

SALEM, Jan. 29.—A wild, lurid tale of official corruption in Portland, giving and taking of bribes and protection money paid was told before the Cleaver investigation committee today by Mrs. Virginia Washburn, Portland social worker, who poses as a women bootlegger. She said she heard so much talk among the underworld characters in relation to the federal prohibition director Linville's office that she sought out Cleaver and Superintendent Herwig of the Anti-Saloon League to offer her services. The committee decided to subpoena Linville so he could refute or substantiate the charges. She said La Ronda Pierce, former employe under Cleaver wanted her to "shake down" Cleaver for \$700 by catching him in a room with the woman's arms around his neck, but that she refused.

SALEM, Jan. 29.—County seat removal fights will be more easily precipitated if the bill introduced by Representative Carkin at the request of the Jackson County Bar Association passes. It provides if one fifth of all the voters in the county at the last general election sign a petition for the county seat removal, the county court shall call a special election within ninety days after the presentation of said petition.

BALDWIN MAY KEEP "HANDS OFF" TRADE AS COOLIDGE DOES

LONDON, Jan. 29.—Stanley Baldwin, Prime Minister of Great Britain, may take a leaf from the book of Calvin Coolidge, President of the United States, and give fears of such an emulation are voiced by the Liberal opponents of Baldwin's Tory Government. News that President Coolidge is for a policy of "hands off of business" and does not intend to call Congress into session for a full year, has been greeted with considerable irony by the opposition press and applauded by the Tory press.

"It is only a few months since Mr. Bonar Law boldly proclaimed 'tranquilly' as his watchword," says the Star, a Liberal newspaper, "and already the Tory press is acclaiming the examples of Mr. Coolidge and expressing hopes for a twelve months' legislative holiday. Twelve months in which nothing is to be done, no laws passed, no evils attacked, no grievances removed, no interests

offended! It is to be the ideal land of the lotus-eaters."

Fears that Baldwin may follow the path of least resistance—in action—are voiced not only by the opposition press, but by some wings of the Tory press as well. J. St. Lee Strachey in "The Spectator," a Tory paper, expresses fears that when it comes to "the tug between stability and stagnation every sort of personal and sophisticated appeal will be made against doing anything." Strachey calls upon Baldwin for a constructive and active policy. There are no signs that Baldwin would be only too glad to resort to a reign of passiveness and he is even now being urged to such a course by some of his supporters.

Tory newspapers are announcing that Britain's trade is on the increase and that property is just in the offing, but that trade needs to be let alone. These
