Predicts Extinction of Jap Aborigines

TOKYO, Jan. 30.—The death of the Ainu race, a group of people said to be the aborigines of Japan, is forecast by Dr. John Batchelor, well-known archaeologist of the Church of England, who has spent nearly half a century among them in their habitat, in the Hokkaido. Dr. Batchelor is a recognized authority on the history of this obscure people.

He declares there are less than 16,000 of them alive today, and that, through assimilation with the Japanese and because of ill health, particularly among the women, they are rapidly dying out and will soon be extinct.

PROSPECTS ARE FOR GOOD YEAR IN 1925 IN ELECTRIC FIRMS

PORTLAND, Jan. 29.—Good years for an industry so indispensable and progressive as the electrical are the rule, rather than the exception. Generally speaking, the man who is connected with this most essential utility, whether engaged in the production or selling of electrical current or apparatus, has no cause to complain over the past year in relation to his business, but, on the other hand, has much to be gratified over.

In the material progress several new records were established. During the year 1924 more than \$1,200,000,000 was raised by the electric light and power companies of the country. One billion of this went to the building of new generating plants and transmission and distribution systems, and extensions to existing systems. The balance was for refunding purposes and represented but one-sixth of the total. The total amount raised in 1924 exceeded by \$300,000,000 the previous high record of 1923, and is indicative of the healthy growth of the industry. The total now invested in the industry is \$6,600,000,000. Expert opinion predicts that the

demand for electrical service will double within the next five years.

Without allowing for increased economies of operation, this will bring the total investment by 1930 in the neighborhood of \$13,000,000,000, although economies through engineering skill and scientific research will probably shave down this figure considerably. In fact, as a promise of this, great economy in fuel consumption was made last year through wider interconnection of generating and distribution systems.

The depression last year by a number of the essential industries was in a degree reflected in central station production by a slight falling off in the progressive yearly increases in electrical current which have occurred since the beginning of the electrical industry. In 1924 over 54,000,000,000 kilowatt-hours was the output, an increase of 6 per cent over the preceding year. The gross revenue of the industry during the last year was \$1,350,000,000, an increase of 5.3 per cent over 1923.

This relation of 6 per cent increase in kilowatt-hours, with increase of 5.3 per cent in gross revenue, plainly indicates the downward trend in the cost of current to the using public.

In addition of approximately 1,900,000 new customers in 1924 brings the total to 16,377,605 customers enjoying electrical service. Of this number 599,915 are industrial power users, 2,524,705 are commercial users and the balance are domestic consumers.

At the close of the year the country was served by 6355 electric light and power companies. The considerable majority of these were privately owned and operated plants, which furnished 95 per cent of electrical service to the country. The tendency of municipalities to abandon or sell their publicly owned plants and purchase energy from private plants, which become noticeable a few years ago, was even more marked than usual during the year just passed. More than 860 municipal plants have been abandoned during the past few years as a result of the increasing knowledge of the economic superiority of privately owned and operated plants over the municipal plants.

Books Are Added to School Library

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 29. — (Special) — During 1924 10,541 volumes were added and 188 withdrawn from the University of Oregon library, a net gain of 10,353, according to a report made by Librarian M. H. Douglass today. The University now contains 140,823 volumes and is the third largest in Oregon. It is exceeded in number of volumes only by the Multnomah County library at Portland and the State library at Salem.

The total number of books issued from the circulation, reference and reserve desks during 1924 was 368,814, of which 68,899 were issued for home use by the circulation and reference departments. There were sent out by mail and express to other libraries and individuals 1093 packages, containing a total of 2830 items.
