MRS. M. BARRON, PIONEER WOMAN PASSES AWAY

century civilization.

Mrs. Barron was a pioneer among the pioneers of this section. As it is recorded that she

came with the first general onset of actual settlers to the Rogue River Valley and assumed an active and important part in the life of a new country so it is also said that she left a record like that of so many other noble pioneer mothers of Southern Oregon which their descendants look upon as their proudest heritage. Surely she must have been of those of whom Joaquin Miller wrote: "The greatest battle that ever was fought Shall I tell you where and when, On the map of the world you will find it not 'Twas fought by the mothers of men."

Martha A. Walker Barron was born at Bethany, Ill., January 1, 1833. With other members of her family she joined the covered wagon company that started from Lee county, Iowa, March 22nd, 1853, for the long trek across the plains to Oregon, and arrived at what for many years was known as Kingsbury Springs, seven miles south of Ashland, Sept. 3rd, 1853. She was married March 18, 1856, to Hugh F. Barron, who died a number of years ago. They lived and labored and builded a large estate about them. Their home at the head of the Valley south of Ashland was one of the

widely known places of the Rogue River Valley. It was well known as a stage station for many years before the advent of the railroad. Her home was also the location of a postoffice for many years, during all of which time she served as postmistress. Endowed with a kindly and courteous dignity it is said of Mrs. Barron that she was as much at ease in the entertainment of the first lady of the land as she was in satisfying the wants of a passing mendicant. Mrs. Barron is survived by four children, one daughter and three sons: Mrs. Alice B. Butler, wife of G. S. Butler of this city, Edward B. Barron, George W. Barron and Homer W. Barron, all of this vicinity, also by four grand-
