YALE HOCKEY TEAM HAS GOOD SEASON

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Feb. 3.—Yale's homeless hockey team is showing form enough this winter to put it into the class of last year's team which swept the ice against all comers and won the intercollegiate hockey championship. Playing all its games out of town, the varsity team took three games from Williams College at Lake Placid, N. Y.; two from Queens College, Toronto, at Pittsburgh, and for good measure beat Princeton at Princeton and Amherst Aggies on a private outdoor rink in the Woodbridge Hills, north of New Haven.

Under C. L. Wanamaker the hockey situation at Yale has been lifted out of the dumps in a short space until lately it has become Yale's leading winter sport. A year hence will see a large arena ready in New Haven, replacing the one that was destroyed by fire last June.

George A. Jenkins, of Ardmore, Pa., playing at goal, is Yale's hockey captain this year. With him are playing Samuel Ferguson, Jr., of Hartford, Conn.; F. A. Potts, 2nd, of New York City; Thomas D. Sargent, of New Haven, and H. F. Turnbull, of Hartford, Conn. Ten other good players form the entire squad.

While the hockey team is sweeping on to new laurels Yale's basketball team is in the midst of an unusually bad season. Team after team has beaten it, both in intercollegiate league games and out until in mid-January the Yale tossers' outfit had but a single victory against defeats by Fordham, Annapolis Pennsylvania and Dartmouth. Two years ago the Yale basketball team rose from last to first place in the intercollegiate league and won the laurels. But the next season the team descended to last place, where it seems likely to stay this year.

CARIO, Egypt, Feb. 3.—The site of the tombs of the long sought fourth dynasty has been discovered. Government excavations have led to what is believed to be the tomb of Pharaoh Shepsekaf. Two fragments of stone tablets of the Shepsekaf period were dug up.

There can be no doubt that most outdoor occupations are by far more healthful than indoor work, since they provide opportunity for an abundance of exercise and fresh air.

Farm life would be better than it is were it not for the fact that various drawbacks are nearly always associated with it—fatigue, bad air at night, lack of hygiene and sanitation, unwholesome food, etc. There is, as a matter of fact, no reason for this, and farm life could be made an ideal life if it were properly managed. Indoor occupations are not so bad if the windows are left wide open and a certain amount of exercise is taken every day; in fact, statistics prove that the average life of the city man is longer than that of the man who lives in the country. There is no just reason for this, and it must be due to the causes mentioned—overheating, lack of sanitation, lack of fresh air at night, etc. for the farmer. Drainage is often a serious problem in the country.

Various occupations are notoriously injurious—mining, stone-cutting, deep-sea diving, work in a steel mill, a paint factory, a leather-bed factory, etc. Small particles of some of the materials used all the air, and are inhaled into the lungs, where they set up serious inflammation, and often cause death. Men who work in paint shops often suffer from lead poisoning. Men who work under great air pressure are liable to suffer from "caisson disease," ending in a frightfully painful death. On the other hand, aviators may die from lack of air. But they are usually able to get back to air levels, and deaths, therefore, do not often occur in this way.

On the whole, it may be said that any occupation may be made more or less healthful by the manner of life which is lived after working hours, and the condition in which the blood and general health is maintained, during the period of labor.

There can be no doubt of the influence of occupation on health, and unquestionably many who are trying to improve their physical condition are laboring under great handicap because of the confinement of their work, the poor ventilation of their working quarters, and perhaps compulsory overwork.

The Friendly Indians are Boys Clubs that are being organized for boys between the ages of 9 and 12.

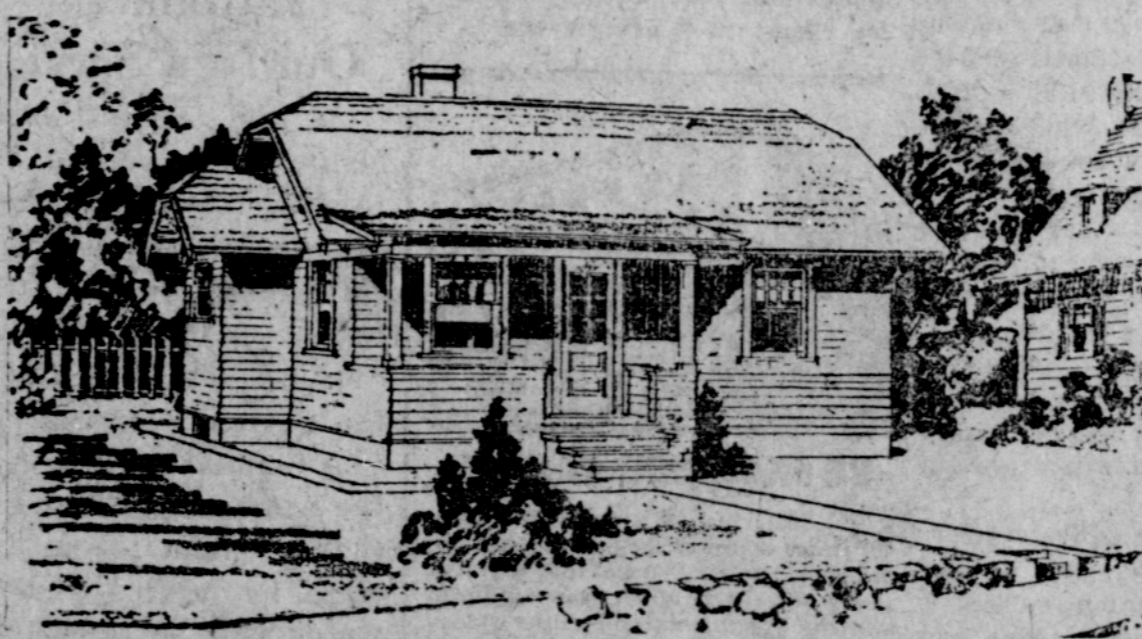

Both of these men stressed the idea that the Y.M.C.A. came in to support the home and the school in a very vital way, that they were well pleased with

the success already attained and hoped that the Y.M.C.A. would continue to function as one of the important activities of this community. Joy pointed out the fact that if the boys of Ashland were capitalized on the basis of their potential earning power in mere dollars and cents by the time they left our schools, the

total value would far exceed the assessed valuation of the district, and that this work was tremendously worth while from a material viewpoint to say nothing of the spiritual value. Professor Forsythe spoke of the experience of many cities that as playgrounds increased juvenile delinquency decreased.

G F a four-room bungalow appeals to you, one that is entirely different, Sherwood will appeal to you. Its plain roof and wall surface, with all necessary and expensive detail left out, is designed with economy in view. Stock materials are used throughout, resulting in a good return for money invested.

This small cottage with a well selected color-scheme will compare favorably with more expensive homes. One could paint the walls a light gray, with the trim and warm white, and with a green-stained roof it would look well.

The plans provide for living-room, bedroom, sleeping alcove, and a roomy kitchen with a breakfast-nook.
