CLEAVER AND HERWIG SHOULD GO

No dishonesty has been proved against Cleaver at the legislative hearing, but none was charged at the outset or at all, except incidentally by a few witnesses. What was mainly charged was that Cleaver's whole conduct of the offices of state prohibition commissioner has been lunglesome and incompetent. These things have been amply proved by the evidence. There was a further grave charge that Cleaver has drawn and expended more money than he was entitled to, under a too-liberal interpretation of the law, whereby he claimed both a prohibition fund and narcotics fund. The committee thus far who have been so robbed, and the exotic few who have seems not to have gone very deeply into this charge.

The most sinister facts uncovered at the hearing concern the relationship of W. J. Herwig, of the Oregon dead or alive, for developing character and social stamanti-saloon league, with the state prohibition department. There is nothing to show that any such efforts succeeded, so far as is announced. These disclosures discredit Herwig as well as Cleaver, and their general effect upon the cause of prohibition enforcement is undeniably bad. The anti-saloon league need to purge itself of Herwig no less than the state needs to purge itself of Cleaver.

FORESTRY-WHAT IS IT?

Forestry is not some vague theory; it is not "Woodsour civilization. It has been variously defined as a policy. man Spare That Tree" oratory. Forestry is the basis of a science, an art and a business. It is all of these.

Briefly, forestry is the growing and wise use of trees for lumber. It means the growing of timber on land unsuited for other uses. It keeps such land busy continuously producing timber and other forest products for the benefit of mankind. It treats the forests as a series of agricultural crops, to be grown, cared for and harvested in uninterrupted succession. A forest is not a mine, to be worked out and abandoned. Forestry seeks to make the land yield just as much in the way of forest products as is possible

Foresters recognize their crop as a necessity in industry and in the life of every civilized man, but before they can apply fully the science and art of forestry to make the forests of this country yield the greatest good to mankind, certain things are necessary. Laws must be revised, policies worked out, money made available, and man-caused fires prevented. Citizens must know what forestry is and what its benefits are before they will want to have forestry practised.

OLD FIGHT OPENS

Echoes of the Jacksonville-Medford fight for the location o fthe county seat of Jackson county were heard in the house in HB No. 214, introduced by Representative Carkin by request of the Jackson County Bar association. So far efforts upon the part of Medford and the remainder of Jackson county to move the court house from Jacksonville to Medford have proven fruitless.

The measure provides that upon petition signed by one-fifth of the votes cast at the previous general election may be sufficient to force the county court to call a special election within 90 days. Prior to this time the petition was available only upon the signatures of three-fifths of the voters.

A previous bill provided that the place selected by the court must be designated and the offices moved within 90 days. Holding that such a transfer would be an impossibility, the new bill gives one year's time to make the change.



CUTTING DOWN INDUSTRIAL WASTE

Experience has shown, the Department finds, that this process of cleaning out items of low or special demand has the effect, of stimulating, rather than stifling, inventive genius and individuality.
