EUROPEAN FLIES FIGHT EARWIGS

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 3.—A dozen European flies have been imported to fight Portland's annual earwig pest.

When they grow up they are expected to multiply by the millions and devour the earwig horde. In fact, earwigs are their chief food and luxury. Scientifically, the flies are classified as "tachnids." They are in the pupae stage—that period of transition in which the larvae are being metamorphosed into flies.

The larvae were gathered in England, but were packed for shipment in France. Swarms of the flies will be turned loose this summer, with commissions to eat all earwigs—pests that annually have been destroying vegetation and plant life in Portland.

Predicts Coal Burning Will Become Criminal

CHICAGO, Feb. 3.—Burning new coal will eventually be a national crime, declared B. G. Dahlberg, Chicago manufacturer, in an address before a conservation congress here. National fuel conservation, a companion endeavor to forest conservation, may yet be met by proper carbonization, which makes a ton of coal yield, on an average three gallons of gasoline, eighteen gallons of crude oil, two gallons of lubricating oil, thirty pounds of sulphate of ammonia, with a residue of 1,400 pounds of smokeless fuel.
