OUTBREAK AGAINST SERBS MAY IMPERIL PEACE IN BALKANS

SOFIA, Feb. 6.—The Balkan cauldron is bubbling again. Arrest of the Croatian peasant leader, Raditch, has caused widespread discontent throughout the Balkans and it seems probable that it may lead to an entente between the discontented Croats and the Macedonians.

Bulgaria is aroused, as Raditch was a great popular favorite here. The fact that in Raditch's documents was found a letter from the once leader of the Macedonians, Alexandroff, pledging his support and that of his organization to the Croatian cause, has made a great impression upon the Macedonians. The Macedonians are aroused because the arrest of Raditch occurred in Belgrade at about the same time that Premier Tsankoff of Bulgaria, was making an official visit there. Some Macedonians have openly charged that Tsankoff has allied himself with Belgrade Imperialists, thus strengthening the government opposition to both Croats and Macedonians.

BURBANK, Cal., Feb. 6.—Daniel Orona, thirty-four, has confessed to local police that he is the hungry burglar who has been robbing meat markets and grocery stores of Burbank for the past month, according to the police report.

PROSPERITY SEEN ALL OVER FAR EAST FOR THE YEAR 1925

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The year 1925 augurs well for many of the countries of the Far East, according to Julius Klein, Director of Foreign Commerce for the Department of Commerce.

With the exception of China, which has been virtually wrecked by civil war, indications point to better business conditions, improved markets and higher prices for leading crops than during the last few years.

In Japan, too, the economic recovery has been retarded, partially by conditions in China and partly as a result of the slow recovery from the earthquake of 1923.

"Gradually, however, the Far East is beginning to recover from unfavorable post-war conditions," Klein said.

"Budgets of most of these countries are on a more stable basis, and surpluses are anticipated by several of them for the first time in a number of years."

In the budgets of the Far East certain factors are common to all the survey disclosed. "With the possible exception of Japan, between 80 and 90 per cent of the population is engaged in agricultural pursuits," Dr. Klein pointed out.

"The success of the harvests and the market demand for agricultural products affect the purchasing power of the people. Crop failures or adverse markets, or the two combined, seriously affect the revenues of the Governments. The post-war depression which stagnated business made itself apparent in the revenue returns of the various countries in diminished receipts from income, business and license taxes and from Government services and monopolies."

Another factor given as common to the budgets of several of the Far Eastern nations is currency. India, Ceylon, China and the Malay states are on a silver monetary basis, it was pointed out, their revenues and expenditures being influenced by the price of silver. A small rise in the gold value of silver will permit the payment of foreign com-

mitments, to the advantage of the silver-using countries. The price of silver has, as a whole, declined since the early part of 1920.

"During the peak of prosperity in 1919 and early in 1920 extensive programs for public works were undertaken by most of the countries under review," Klein said. "These programs either had to be curtailed or completely given up after the depression set in, which naturally affected extraordinary expenditures."

Budget estimates in the Far East were said to be based upon conservative computation, while the tendency is to underestimate revenues. Custom duties, direct taxation and receipts from Government services and monopolies, including opium, salt and camphor, constitute the principal sources of ordinary revenue of the Far Eastern Governments. Extraordinary revenue is ob-

tained by the transfer of portions of the budget surpluses, when such exist, and from loans raised locally or abroad. Ordinary expenditures, the survey showed, are used for Government administration, while extraordinary expenditures are incurred for public works and naval and military purposes.
