## ORDERS FOR MOTOR ACCESSORIES USED BY RUM RUNNERS

PLATTSBURGH, N. Y., Feb. 11.—"Send me down five inner tubes and six boxes of patches." This telephone message may carry little light to the men and women who are uninitiated in the mysteries of the alcohol trail. To certain rum runners located at Champlain and Rouse's Point, the source of supply at the border, however, the apparently innocent order for supplies to keep the old flivver running means an entirely different thing.

"Patches," in the new vocabulary of bootlegging, as engaged in along the northern part of the State, means "Canadian ale," while "inner tubes" is taken as a code word for "hard liquor." "Ever hear some bird call up Rouse's Point, St. John's or Champlain and ask the guy on the other end to 'bring me down ten boxes of inner tubes?'" inquired one veteran today.

"We don't fall for that bunk. If you were in the game you would know 'inner tubes' means whiskey, while 'patches' means ale and beer. Why, just last night I sat in a hotel here and heard a bird from Albany calling Bill at Champlain with a Federal man sitting less than ten feet from him.

"Hello, Bill!" the runner said. "Say, can you send me down six inner tubes right away? I want them for a fellow that's buying a second-hand car. Yeah, the same kind we sold Steve. He likes the Red brand best."

"The dry agent must have been asleep, for anyone with a bit of sense would know this fellow didn't come way up here to buy

inner tubes for a second-hand car from Champlain. The Red brand? Sure, that's Johnny Walker, red label, the high-priced stuff you get in Canada. Each time a fellow orders an inner tube he means a case you know, and the same goes with patches."

According to this man huge bootlegging operations are carried on by use of the code words. Some times he declares, as high as \$100,000 worth of liquor went racing down-State from Plattsburgh transfer points upon the receipt of a telegram worded like this:

"Turkey market good here. Send me down as many as you can buy tonight by express. Will be able to unload immediately at good profit. Can handle up to 150. Can you make it?"

Such a message filed at Albany or Syracuse during the late afternoon would be the signal for the caravan to pull out from here during the night with the "turkeys". The "ship by express" clause is generally included to throw off any possible sleuths who might happen across the message in some manner, and to allay suspicion of operators through whose hands the message passes.

Another clever way of ordering out the rum runners in this territory is said to be through "tipping" the officers. A telephone call from a point some distance west of where the liquor loads are to cross the border informs the Federal agents at the Malone office that "the biggest bunch of cars ever seen here are headed for the line near Trout River or Flynn's Corners," two noted booze inlets. The "informer" always refuses to make himself known with the excuse: "I don't want to get mixed up in this thing, but want to help the Government make it dry."

Every available officer is then said to be called toward the

threatened leak, and while the Federal men patrol every road in the vicinity the booze caravans race across the line, pass the "danger zone" south of the border and seep well on their way to their destination before the officers are aware of the trick, the rum runner said.
