NURSERYMEN SEEK "PRAYING MANTIS" TO KILL PARASITES

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Feb. 11.—When the subject of beneficial insects is reached at the American Association of Nurserymen's Convention, in Rochester, next June the old controversy as to whether Rochester is entitled to the credit of discovering the praying mantis in this country is expected to be resumed.

In 1901 H. F. Atwood, predecessor of Park Commissioner William S. Riley, attracted national attention by announcing his discovery of the praying mantis in one of the parks here. This was hailed with joy by nurserymen and agriculturists generally, because the mantis had a world-wide reputation as a praying insect, as well as a praying insect, its prey being harmful insects of a thousand and one varieties.

Then up spoke Colonel E. W. Kirkpatrick, of McKinney, Texas, who said that the praying mantis had been common in his part of the country for forty years and, therefore, Rochester had nothing special to brag about. Mr. Atwood made a study of the matter and answered by pointing out that what Colonel Kirkpatrick knew in Texas was the phasmopantia carolina, while the Rochester visitor was the genuine mantis religiosa, common only in Europe, Africa and the Orient.

North and South became divided on the subject. For one thing growers of Dixie Land could see no reason why Mr. Atwood's mantis should have exclusive right to the title of religious, when he insisted on giving their insect the family name of Carolina. The Southern insect struck just as devout an attitude as the Northern one and was equally diligent in devouring harmful insects. They also contended that the fantastic common phasmopantia was a lexicographical phantasmagoria trumped up to cloud the issue.
