TWO BOY SLAYERS ARE TO BE HANGED ON "HOODOO DAY"

BUTLER, Ga., Feb. 12.—Tomorrow, Friday, the Thirteenth, Gervis Bloodworth and Willie Jones, boys who have not yet reached the age of 20, were to be hanged in the yard of the Taylor County Jail here for the murder of H. F. Underwood—the climax to one of the most prolonged and unusual battles for the lives of condemned slayers in the history of the State.

Underwood, a sewing machine salesman, was slain and his body thrown by the side of the road more than a year ago. In the search for his slayers Jones and Bloodworth came under attention for they had been spending money. It was so unusual for them even to have any money at all that they were taken into custody and confessed. They said they had been drinking for a week from a barrel of whiskey they had found and were drunk when Underwood, driving his car along a country road, overtook them and offered them a ride, which they accepted. They had ridden only a short way, they said, when they attacked and killed Underwood and robbed him of about \$40.

Excitement was high in the community when the confession became known and the youths were removed to the Muscogee County Jail at Columbus, where they since have remained except for excursions here for trial and sentencing.

When sentence was first passed attorneys for the boys began pleas

for their lives before the Supreme Court, Prison Commission and Governor but all fell on deaf ears. Jones' mother, weeping, went to Atlanta and begged Governor Walker to commute her boy's sentence. Although visibly affected he declared he could not interfere.

Then came the most startling development of all. On January 9, the very day the boys were expected to be hanged, their attorney visited Judge W. E. H. Searcy at Griffin, Ga., and asked for an injunction stopping the hanging, pointing out that the stockade built here for the executions was a violation of the Georgia law, which specifies that executions must be privately held. He declared there were cracks in the board fence and that no roof covered the stockade. It would be simple, he held, for any one to view the hangings by merely going to a nearby house and climbing to the roof.

Judge Searcy, having experienced intense disgust, he said, through a similar situation at an execution in Griffin, issued the injunction. It was not served on the sheriff until the two boys had been brought here from Columbus to be hanged.

However, the stay was brief. Just as soon as the stockade could be refinished and well covered from prying gaze, Judge Searcy heard a formal argument for a permanent injunction, denied it, and resented the boys to hang.

Two feeble motions, one that the court was sitting in vacation and therefore not competent to sentence the boys, and another that he was not qualified to pass sentence because the court had not been called by the judge of the circuit, were overruled, but exceptions noted, and preparations made for another plea to the Supreme Court.

New Maid, Gems, Furs Go as Owner Entertains

CHICAGO, Feb. 12.—While Mrs. Nellie Vehon, wife of Morris Vehon, wealthy tailor, was entertaining friends at a tea party, Mrs. Louise Wernitzer, her maid, disappeared and at the same time jewelry and furs valued at \$84,000 to \$94,000 were missed.

Sew Up Pockets in New Tuxedos for Waiters

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 12.—Unique tailoring will feature the new styles of waiters' uniforms that will appear in leading San Francisco restaurants.

Health Hints by the Father of Physical Culture

A general term applied to faulty digestion is dyspepsia. The disease must be considered more as a condition of functional disturbances of the glands of the stomach than as a diseased state of this organ. The secretive and absorptive functions of these glands may be impaired in many ways—through over-eating, or the eating of unwholesome food; insufficient mastication; the poverty of the blood; and a deficiency in the character and quantity of secretions of the glands.

The difficulty often experienced in the cure of a case of long standing is primarily due to the burdened condition of the blood. This reacts upon the digestive juices, impairs their chemical efficiency and thus almost any combination of food, however digestible in theory, proves in practice a further addition to the existing burden. Remarkable results can be obtained in the treatment of this particular ailment by the complete abstinence of fasting and the milk diet. I have seen some recoveries that could almost be termed miraculous as the result of these methods in this particular complaint. I would first of all suggest a fast consisting of complete abstinence from all nourishment liquid or solid with the drinking of water merely when the definite desire for it is noted, this for as long a period as the patient can abstain from food without serious loss of strength. I do not by any means advise that the patient continue the fast until it becomes necessary for him to remain in bed except in some cases.

Rebuilding of Bank of England Under Way

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The great task of rebuilding the Bank of England is under way. The architect of the new edifice is Herbert Baker, one of whose earliest works was the building of Grovet Schuur for Cecil Rhodes, outside Cape Town.

Considerable amount of discussion has taken place as to how much, if any, of the old building should be incorporated in the new. The Bank of England is generally regarded as the greatest achievement of Sir John Soane, and lovers of London's old buildings were naturally anxious to retain as much of his work as possible. The directors of the bank only wanted more room for their staff, which has vastly increased since Soane's day.

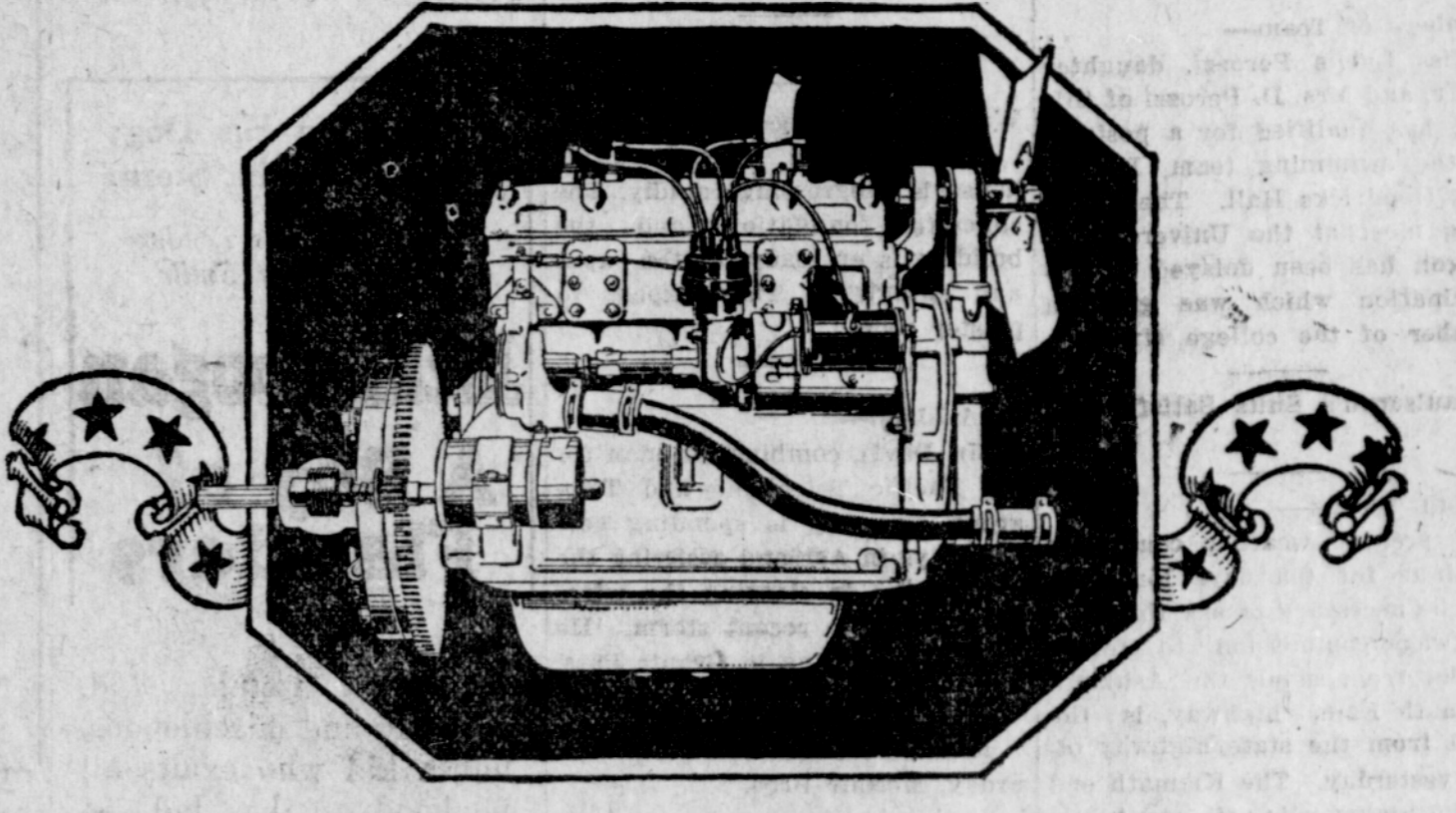
