The petition for the anti-gossip law, sent to Mayor John A. Gilles and to leaders among the Aldermen, reads, in part, as follows: "Honorable Sir: "It is our belief that there is a real need for a new ordinance in this city similar to ordinances in effect in a number of other cities, making it a misdemeanor to gossip about one's neighbors—or, for that matter, about anybody. "We respectfully petition you to take this matter up for discussion at the next meeting of the Common Council and to pass an ordinance here which would provide a fine, or a jail sentence, for a person convicted of telling malicious lies detrimental either to individuals or to business concerns. "As you probably are aware there is much gossip here, founded on nothing more truthful than wild rumor. The result is that very often people's reputations are injured, sometimes ruined, when they are perfectly innocent of the acts ascribed to them. "Police Judge Emmett Watkins, of Owensboro, Ky., has explained how the law was enforced, in a case recently before him, as follows: "The first person tried in my court under this law was a woman who came from the country on a morning train. She was carrying a sack. "A man who knew her asked her what she had in the sack. She said she had 'white mule.' "The man told her she had better be careful, or the officers would get her. She foolishly replied that she was not uneasy, that anyone could take any of the Owensboro policemen around the corner, give him a dram and get by. "Police go fifty-fifty with the bootleggers here," she said.

**WORKERS URGING LAWS TO PUNISH IDLE GOSSIPERS**

ENDICOTT, N. Y., Feb. 13. — If the Common Council grants a petition received by officials today, one will have to stop talking about one's neighbors—or go to jail—for the petition asks that the Aldermen enact an ordinance similar to one which is working out successfully in several other cities, making it a misdemeanor to gossip.

The petition, signed by "A Group of E. J. Workers," makes the specific request that the Council follow the lead taken by the town of Owensboro, Ky., and enact a law which would provide a penalty of fine or imprisonment, or both, for conviction upon a charge of "scattering false rumors, or spreading lies about people both in public and private life."

The law is being enforced in the Kentucky town, the petition says, and Judge Emmett Watkins recently fined a woman \$10 for saying that she could bribe any policeman with a dram of "white mule."

"A policeman heard her, swore out a warrant for her under the Anti-Gossip law, and fined her ten dollars." (Signed) "A GROUP OF E. J. WORKERS"

**TEST DISCLOSES NO SHORT CUT TO TOMB OF MAN**

regular breathing.

**SAND CAVE, Ky., Feb. 13.**— It was definitely determined that there is no short cut to the tomb in which Floyd Collins is trapped. Long hours of drilling and digging throughout last night disclosed that no fissure in the main body of the cave will expediate the removal of the entombed cave explorer who has lain in the tunnel of the cave for the past eighteen days.

When the core drill, racing through the soil, fifteen feet from where the shaft was being sunk, reached a depth of 65 feet, a tunnel was disclosed, but a drift test in the bottom of the shaft now being sunk revealed no such tunnel.

It is estimated by experienced men that at least another forty eight hours will be necessary to drill the tunnel through the hard limestone to the point where the test disclosed the fissure.

The workers who are laboring on the shaft are still hopeful that Collins may be found alive.

**MEN FINED FOR GAME VIOLATIONS**

Dan Watson and his brother, Al Watson, were this morning fined \$25 each by Judge Taylor, after pleading guilty to charges of violating game laws.

The men were arrested on their place on Neil Creek. Dan charged with possessing deer meat out of season, while Al was charged with trapping fur bearing animals without a license. Roy Parr, local deputy game warden arrested the men yesterday and brought them into court this morning.

**WITNESSES GIVEN LIQUOR SAYS WALSH**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—The department of Justice has launched an investigation of the charges that the government's witnesses brought here to testify against Senator Wheeler, Democrat of Montana, have been given large supplies of liquor. Senator Walsh, Wheeler's colleague brought the charges, saying that the witnesses had been virtual prisoners in the Washington hotels, where they have been staging drinking parties.
