THE ASHLAND PROPERTY OWNERS,

Ladies and Gentlemen:
On Tuesday, you are asked to visit the polls of this city to vote upon two propositions calling for the issuance of city improvement bonds totaling \$12,500. One of these propositions calls for the purchase of the Chantauqua building and the site upon which it stands, while the other would raise money for the purchase of the Lily H McCormick tract, almost 17 acres in extent, both to be used as additions to the city park system.

Both these propositions have been recommended to you by the Mayor and by the majority of the members of his council. These men, looking for the betterment and beautifying of Ashland, have carefully thought the matter out and have agreed that the purchase of these properties will be a wise investment for the city. Your Auntie agrees with them.

We have one of the finest municipally owned parks in the country, one which has brought us advertising it would have been impossible to obtain through any publication or group of publications. Thousands of tourists who have stopped in the public camp grounds in the park, who have wandered throughout its wide acres, who have viewed the scenic beauty of it, have given us word of mouth advertising worth hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Every indication points to an increased tourist travel for the coming year. We must have the facilities to care for these tourists who will stop in our city. Unless we have these facilities, these tourists will move on to other cities, and Ashland will soon lose her place as the greatest tourist city in Oregon. The purchase of the McCormick tract appears to be the only possible means for the expansion of our camp ground. Our Park Commissioners have assured us that it is the final outpost of expansion for the entire park. These men have given the matter much thought, and were convinced in their own minds before they made the purchase plan public.

As a financially sound investment the Park Commissioners have shown us how they can retire the bonds to be issued by revenue derived from cabins to be erected upon the land in the tract. They have done this with other purchases and there is no reason to believe they cannot do it with the proposed addition. Therefore, it appears we cannot lose by the purchase, that it will be made without the expenditure of a cent by the city. All development work will be completed with revenue derived from the rental of the cabins in the camp ground.

With the purchase of the proposed addition, Ashland will be well prepared to care for the tourist travel for years to come. In addition, the tract purchase will give the Park Commissioners an opportunity to construct a natural swimming pool, something which will give the city much favorable publicity.

The purchase of the Chantauqua building appears to be as financially sound as any purchase could be. The land alone, according to real estate men who are well versed in land values in the city is worth the price at which the entire building and site will be sold. Unless the city purchases the building at the time it is sold to satisfy the claims of the holder of the mortgage against it, it will certainly go into private hands and the people will lose the opportunity of holding the structure which distinguishes this city from other Southern Oregon cities, a monument to the progressiveness of those who obtained for Ashland the Chantauqua circuit attractions moulded together for cities far surpassing us in size.

The argument has been advanced by opponents of both propositions that the land has always been where it is, open for purchase, and will be there in the future. At other times in the history of Ashland, the people have taken the same line of reasoning, only to pay dearly for it when the time came that the purchase were imperative. Land available for park purposes has risen in value during the past and the city has paid for the increase. This same thing is liable to happen again.

Auntie Ashland urges every property owner to support these two measures. They mean much prosperity for the city, more than we can now realize.

Get out Tuesday and vote in favor of the purchase of the McCormick tract and the Chantauqua building and site as additions to the city park system.

MACEDONIA MAY CAUSE TROUBLE IN THE BALKANS

SOPIA, Feb. 14. — The Macedonian question continues to be the cause of friction between Serbia and Bulgaria.

It seems evident that the success of the present mission of Premier Tsankoff to Serbia must depend upon the way in which he proposes to treat future Macedonian questions, which must inevitably cause trouble in the Balkans if they are left unsettled, as has been the practice heretofore.

The newspapers of both countries seize upon any outrage perpetrated by or against the Macedonians as a sign of persecution, and both Premier Pasitch and Premier Tsankob have been in turn charged with persecution or praised for their actions.

One incident which caused much irritation in Belgrade was the fact that the day Premier Tsankoff arrived there a prominent former Macedonian, who had entered the Serbian service for the purpose of persecuting Macedonians, was killed by one of his old comrades.

The Serbian newspapers connected the two events and charged Premier Pasitch with the betrayal of Serbia's vital interests.
