NEW ENGLAND IS BUILDING FAST BOSTON, Feb. 14.—New England is to witness a record-breaking year in building construction, particularly in Boston and several other large Massachusetts cities, if present reports issued here by the United States Employment Service in any criterion. Boston already has issued permits for construction totalling an approximate \$30,000,000 and looks forward to leading the New England States in building construction. The buildings contemplate range from the ordinary apartment house or small dwelling, to the large hotel and hospital buildings. Several large houses are now under construction in Portland, Me., and will afford employment to many tradesmen, and work is expected to commence later on two large hotel buildings, Lewiston, Rockport, Brunswick, Saco, Camden and Auburn are contemplating fair-sized building programs. Building construction in New Hampshire is considered satisfactory. Vermont will proceed with the building of dwelling houses and of small industry and commercial structures, and is expected to equal the record of the past year. In Massachusetts considerable building is planned, and improvements bid fair to surpass those of previous years. In Lynn the erection of a junior high school, at a cost of \$400,000, is planned for 1925, and a number of moderate-priced houses also, will be built. AUSTRALIA PLANS ROYAL GREETING PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 14.—As a means of promoting greater interchange of commodities between the United States and the South Seas, the Australian Government plans to establish trade representative at various Pacific Coast ports, according to Dr. Earl Page, Minister of State for the Treasury of Australia, who is on a tour of the United States. Problems of highway, marketing, reclamation, hydro - electric development and other phases of national progress will be closely investigated, by Dr. Page, who was a leading surgeon of Australia before entering politics. "Australia's first interest is, of course, with the British, with whom 64 per cent of our trade is done; but the country is vitally interested in America," he said. "The trade with America is the second largest. "Just now Australia buys \$176,000,000 worth of goods from America annually, while America buys only \$40,000,000 from us. If the trade could be balanced it would be a mutual benefit, and that is why we are investigating the possibility of locating trade representatives on the Pacific Coast. "We have had a bountiful year in the Antipodes. Our total production will bring approximately \$2,000,000,000, of which \$400,000,000 will be for wool and \$200,000,000 for wheat."
