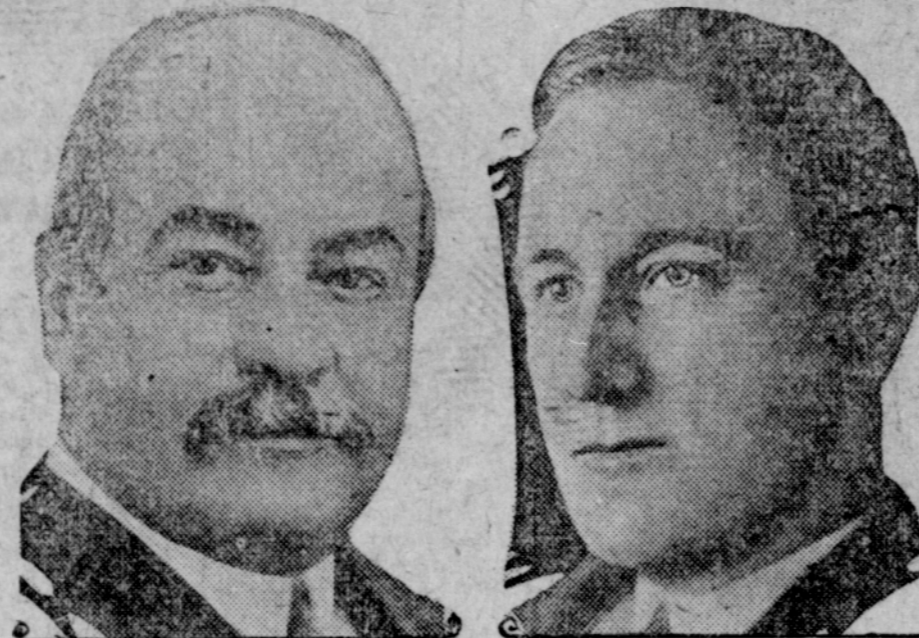
In Jacksonville— Mrs. Sam McNair and Mrs. Bertha Denton journeyed to Jacksonville yesterday to attend to business matters in that city.

Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, New York City, and one of America's foremost educators, has undergone an operation there for glaucoma of the right eye, a disease affecting the eyeball. A boom has been launched in the South for the nomination, four years hence, of Franklin D. Roosevelt of New York as the Democratic candidate for the Presidency. Rogers Hornby, star second baseman for the St. Louis Cardinals, has signed a three-year contract at a salary of \$33,333.33 a year. Walter Johnson, star pitcher of the world champion Senators, has given up his efforts to buy a Pacific Coast club and will pitch again for Washington.

W. S. BALL, WELL KNOWN RESIDENT CALLED BY DEATH
