BRITISH RULER BESTOWS SWORD ON U S OFFICER

BALTIMORE, Feb. 22. — Just two days after George Washington's Birthday, D. Francis Tozier, eighty two, a retired officer of the United States Coast Guard Service, will receive the crowning glory of his eventful life. The honor will be bestowed in the form of a sword, the gift of the late King Edward VII, to replace a sword Tozier sacrificed in aiding Great Britain twenty-three years ago.

Tozier, who is spending his declining years at the United States Marine Hospital here, is awaiting the honor with all the happy anticipation of a child before Christmas. Once before King Edward presented him with a sword, but the United States does not allow its officials to accept presents from foreign Governments except by act of Congress, and it was not until last May that Congress acted in behalf of the octogenarian.

Recently Tozier received a letter, embellished with the great seal of the British Empire and signed by Captain F. L. Titchener, Naval Attaché of the British Embassy at Washington, advising him that on February 24, Sir Esmo Howard, British Ambassador to the United States, would call upon him at the hospital and present the sword.

When asked how he happened to sacrifice a sword for Great Britain, Tozier explained: "In 1902 I commanded the old ship Grant, and we were assigned to look for His Majesty's man of war Condor, which had disappeared. We found one of her empty boats beached on an old Indian chief's reservation on Vancouver Island. I dickered with the chief for the boat, and he demanded \$50 and my sword. I tried to persuade him away from the sword part of the bargain; but

one can't argue with an Indian, and finally I gave in. "The old sword was a good one but I'll bet the King's new one will be better," the ancient mariner concluded.

NORFOLK, Feb. 23. — A jury in City Circuit Court here decided that Police Lieutenant W. S. White will have to pay Otto Foerster, a bluejacket stationed at Hampton Roads Naval Base, \$35 for alleged unlawful arrest as a vagrant.

Foerster charged, in a suit for \$1,500 damages, that the officer arrested him and detained him for two hours, and "greatly exposed and injured his credit and circumstances and caused him great pain." And it was not until he produced papers to show he was a United States sailor that Foerster was acquitted in police court.
