COMMITTEE BLUFF NO FUNDS CALLED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The offers of personal finances to enable the house aircraft committee to conduct the investigation into the air craft conditions of the army and navy came to light today. MOTION PICTURES TO BE CENSORED HERE

SALEM, Feb. 23.—The house today passed a bill creating a state board of motion picture censorship, with but ten negative votes cast. The bill provides for a board of three members, appointed by the state board of control, one person to be connected with the distribution and exhibition of motion pictures. The annual salary of each member is not to exceed \$2400. The board is empowered to appoint three viewers, each to receive not more than \$2,000 yearly.

Vancouver Has Big Year in Shipping

TOKYO, Feb. 23.—An ancient treasure chest has been unearthed in an orchard at Yura, a small town in the mountains of Northern Japan.

Workmen uncovered a box containing relics believed to have been left behind by the Emperor Goshirakawa, who built a temple in that locality more than 1000 years ago. Ancient swords, decorations believed to have been worn by royalty, and many specimens of pottery were found in the chest.

Archaeologists are examining the relics with a view to determining their age, genuineness and value.

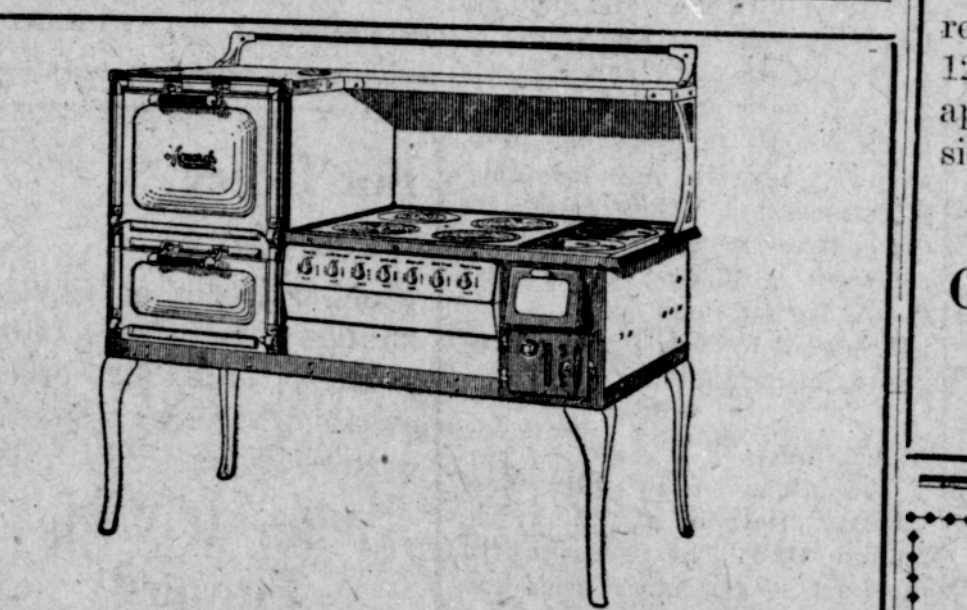
