A WORD FOR "JAZZ"

"Jazz", taken in right proportions is beneficial to the miss of 1925 and the unrestricted hygienic style of dress of the young woman of today make for fine, healthy womanhood and long life, according to a medical expert of one of the world's largest life insurance companies.

The propriety of "jazz" has been the subject of a great deal of discussion in San Francisco, due to its introduction in the Young Women's Christian Association of that city as a means of recreation for girls.

The pronouncement of an expert in a science that frowns on anything and everything that tends to reduce longevity has been received by the San Francisco Y. W. C. A. with great pleasure. It is regarded as vindication of the stand of that institution.

The interpretation placed upon "jazz" and the environment in which "jazz" is found are the two important factors to be considered in placing upon it the stamp of approval or disapproval.

A San Francisco clergyman believes a little "jazz" is all right, if the word does not mean the ultra-vulgar dancing of the underworld. One may see evil in everything if one wishes. Much wrongdoing has been attributed to "jazz". There can be overindulgence and dissipation in anything, but in so many instances, those who have criticised have overlooked excessive indulgence in their desire to criticise the thing that is indulged in. So it is with "jazz". The young man and woman of today are being brought up in a totally different atmosphere than their forebears. They are being taught that frankness in everything is to be desired above false modesty. "Jazz" is a natural development of an age, in which equality of sex is more and more being stressed. It should not be suppressed as long as it can be guided along proper paths. There does not seem to be any reason why it cannot become a big factor in healthy development of the young. It is a recreative diversion and only becomes something more sinister, when one wants it to become that.

Youth has always danced and will always dance. The world has not suffered therefor, nor will it suffer if dancing of the future is directed as the most of the dancing of the past has been directed—along recreational lines.

The "jazz" of today is beneficial in the declaration of the physical director of the San Francisco Y. W. C. A., who says that every noon, dancing is allowed among these girls, most of them working girls, dance off the fatigue that has accumulated during the morning.

Less hasty criticism of "jazzmania" and more careful study of it would be of benefit to all of us.

GOODING BILL DROPPED

In the House the Commerce Committee of Congress dropped the Gooding bill by a vote of 11 to 6. It was a bill affecting the long and short haul provisions of the Transportation act.

Commercial organizations and business interests of the Pacific Coast and majority of the Interstate Commerce Commission strongly opposed the bill. It would have given steamship interests a monopoly and possible rate increases.

The present Transportation act empowers the Interstate Commerce Commission, where the facts of the case justify, to grant a transcontinental line authority to charge less for a longer than a shorter haul over the same line, this being done in instances to enable the carriers to load cars they would otherwise haul empty.

This phase of the law was sought to be repealed by the Gooding act, and it was the opinion of Pacific Coast commercial and business interests that the public welfare would be best served by the law as it stands.

RADICAL ACTIVITIES VS. AMERICAN INSTITUTIONS

In a recent stirring address in New York City on the subject "Are Radical Activities weakening American Institutions," Martin W. Littleton, one of the ablest constitutional lawyers in the United States said in part:

"Polyglot radicalism—embracing everything from a disgruntled Republican and a dissatisfied Democrat to a jarring Socialist and a raging Red—dissolved into its original elements in the fierce fires of the last campaign. Each of these elements in its own way is imitating the strident grasshopper in the corner of the fence.

"The factions and feckless alliance is broken and the deformity of the whole movement stands uncovered; but the real purpose of radicalism is unchanged. Its forces may be shattered into unrelated fragments and its union of paradoxes may be dissolved; but Revolution, of the essence of which it was but a symptom, abides with us always.

"It inheres in and clings to all civilization. It is not provoked by war nor allayed by peace. It is not born of

political defection nor cured by political harmony. It is present at the birth of every government and administers not infrequently at the death of many.

"Government substitution for the individual, government taking the place of the man and the woman, government hovering over the community and stifling the air, making the breath of liberty hard, difficult. Government, with its agencies and its minions, and its authorities, treading on your heels wherever you go, crossing your threshold, invading your home, reaching into the nursery of your children—government, and what is this thing called government?"

"This is mine and yours, an agency, an instrument. It isn't some foreign, hideous, powerful creature of the mystic ages set up to govern and to control and adjust and administer to man. Government is mine and yours to do with as our judgment and our intelligence we think it should do, always mindful of the individual. Any government that invades the sacred domain of individuality is a government which does not belong to a period of American liberty.

"Public ownership proposals are but step in the general direction in which radicalism is endeavoring to lead the government."

OIL INDUSTRY SERVES PUBLIC

Reviewing conditions in the petroleum industry, J. Edgar Pew, President of the American Petroleum Institute, expresses the opinion that "the condition of the oil business is better than it has been for several years."

"Within the industry there is a better spirit of co-operation for the benefit of all. Standards of equipment are being established that should very considerably reduce the costs of materials and increase the efficiency of all field labor. Drilling operations are conducted with better success as a result of geological data, largely developed within the past few years. New pools of oil are being discovered with greater frequency and with less of the wildcat type of operations than ever before.

"The relations of the industry to the public are improving. The problems confronting the industry, its responsibilities and its great achievements are being better understood.

"I do not look with alarm upon any prophecies of a scarcity of oil during this year, or for many years to come. The oil industry has in a big way accomplished the seemingly impossible in the amount of oil it has produced notwithstanding repeated predictions to the contrary that there was no such amount of oil to be had. I am confident that the precedent of its past performances will be fully maintained in the future for many years to come, and until science and invention shall have provided a good and sufficient substitute for oil products. This seems to me to be a safe presumption. On the whole, the future of the legitimate oil business looks very bright."

Interests Young Men in Civic Affairs

CINCINNATI, O., Feb. 25. — Cincinnati, known for years as one of the most conservative of cities, is waking up, according to officials of the Business Men's Club and the Chamber of Commerce.

In an effort to encourage young men to take more interest in the affairs of their city, George J. Gruen, president of the Business Men's Club, announces that hereafter there will be a junior membership class, open to young men whose ages range from eighteen to thirty years.

POSTAL PAY BOOST BILL PASSES HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25. —The postal salary bill today passed the house by a vote of 370-8. The bill makes possible the rearrangement of postal rates on various classes of matter carried by the postal service to increase the revenue in order to meet the additional charges for the salary boost of approximately \$98,000 to be given employees. The additional revenues from the increased postal charges is expected to be \$61,000,000.

Canada's Wheat Yield Is Greatest Per Acre

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 24. — Canada has a higher yield of wheat per acre than any other important wheat-exporting country in the world, according to E. S. Hopkins, field husbandman of the Dominion Department of Agriculture. "The average yield per acre of wheat over a period of twenty three years of the chief exporting countries is: Canada, 17.8; the United States, 14.1; India, 11.3; Argentina, 10.6; and Australia, 10.4," says Mr. Hopkins in a recent report.
