SKYSCRAPERS ARE SOON TO REPLACE ANCIENT CONVENT

BALTIMORE, Feb. 26.—The most important architectural change since that which followed the Baltimore fire in 1904 will result when the present Academy and Convent of the Visitation, in the heart of this city, is replaced by modern skyscrapers of industry.

The convent, which for nearly a century has stood as a landmark within a stone's throw of Baltimore's commercial district, was recently sold for approximately \$1,000,000, and the Sisters of the Visitation are planning to move to their new home in the suburbs on a tract of peaceful tranquility—well out of reach of the rapidly growing demands of the commercial growth of the city.

Meantime, the purchasers of the convent are planning to raze the old buildings to make way for the business structures.

The passing of the convent from the city is viewed by many with dismay. The ancient brick buildings, surrounded by massive brick walls, were regarded as of distinct historical as well as religious value. It was erected in 1839, when Martin Van Buren was President, and Congress had just adopted its gag resolutions against petitions calling for abolition of slavery in the District of Columbia.

Since then Baltimore has doubled and redoubled and the tentacles of business growth have reached out and surrounded

the spot of religious seclusion.

For years the roar of the city has been a hardship to the Sisters of the Visitation. But their pleasure in moving to a more appropriate location is tempered by regret in leaving the old grounds, which for so many years have been their home.

New Liquor Scheme Found by Raiders

BROCKTON, Mass., Feb. 26.—Dry agents swooped down on the home of Bolls Messod and began a search. Four hours failed to reveal any evidence. When the raiding party was about to leave one of the raiders accidentally kicked the lower part of a door, and the threshold moved.
