"CONCORD BRIDGE" CONFLICT WILL BE REFOUGHT IN APRIL

CONCORD, Feb. 26. — This city is busily engaged in preparation for the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the famous battle of "Concord Bridge," to be staged April 19 and 20 next. Plans are already under way for the reproducing of the famous battle at the Old North Bridge, the engagement which marked the beginning of the American Revolutionary War.

City officials and fraternal organizations are co-operating to produce a fitting memorial of this famous old engagement. A parade, with more than 4,000 marchers in line, and numerous floats furnished by the fraternal and historical organization, will be one of the features of the anniversary.

Invitations to attend have been forwarded to President Coolidge, the Governors of many States and other national and State dignitaries. Funds necessary to stage the affair have been appropriated by Congress and the Massachusetts Legislature. Efforts are under way to secure the services of the United States Marine Band. This band played at the 100th anniversary celebration and marched in the parade at the time.
