TRADE BALANCE AGAINST IRELAND SHOWS INCREASES

DUBLIN, Feb. 27. - The Free States trade and shipping returns have been completed up to the end of last November, and it is possible now to form a fairly accurate estimate of Ireland's profit and loss during the past year.

Exports for the eleven months amount to 44,617,186 pounds sterling, while imports reach the larger sum of 60,857,803 pounds sterling. The Free State therefore has an adverse trade balance of 16,250,000 pounds sterling for the eleven months, which works out at the rate of almost 18,000,000 pounds sterling per annum.

When it is remembered that before the World War Ireland as a whole had often a favorable trade balance of as much as 15,000,000 pounds sterling per year, the seriousness of the present situation will be recognized.

Of course, the Free State has to its credit the invisible trade. Nobody can tell with a certainty how much money comes into the Free State every year in the form of dividends and interest on securities invested abroad, but it is estimated at 10,000,000 pound sterling. But against this there are the invisible exports which Irish Nationalists pay to foreign firms for shipping freights and insurance premiums.

Looking over these one finds that trade with the United States is still a very low ebb. Whilst the people of the Free State bought from Britain 42,322,760 pounds sterling she only purchased 2,961,842 pounds worth of goods from the United States.

However, bad as things are here they are not as bad as things are

at the other side of the Irish Sea. In Britain in 1922 the deficit was £180,000,000. In 1923 it had risen to £210,000,000, 16 per cent of Britain's whole trade.

The deficit on the Free State's trade is 14 per cent. While it is now £344,000,000, or

"Birds are not wild; it is the human beings that are wild," declared Jack Milner, owner of a bird refuge at Kingeville (Canada), on Lake Erie, here recently.

"You never saw a bird fly away from animals," continued Milner, "nor from those few men who have the patience and kindness to court their friendship."

Milner declared he had been a hunter until twenty years ago and said he used to be one of the most extensive "pot-hunters," or "whole-sale murderers of game in my part of the country—Ohio—where I was born.

"Then I became converted," stated the bird lover, "to loving 'wild' life, particularly birds. They used to fly, screaming, away from me. About that time my brother died in a gunning accident. I began to wonder about things, and I became the birds' friend.

"My 200-acre farm in Kingsville has the protection of the Canadian Government, and no hunting is allowed within one mile of its borders.

"Last Spring 15,000 persons came in one day to see the countless geese, ducks and swans that I was feeding. Last March and April I fed them more than 3,300

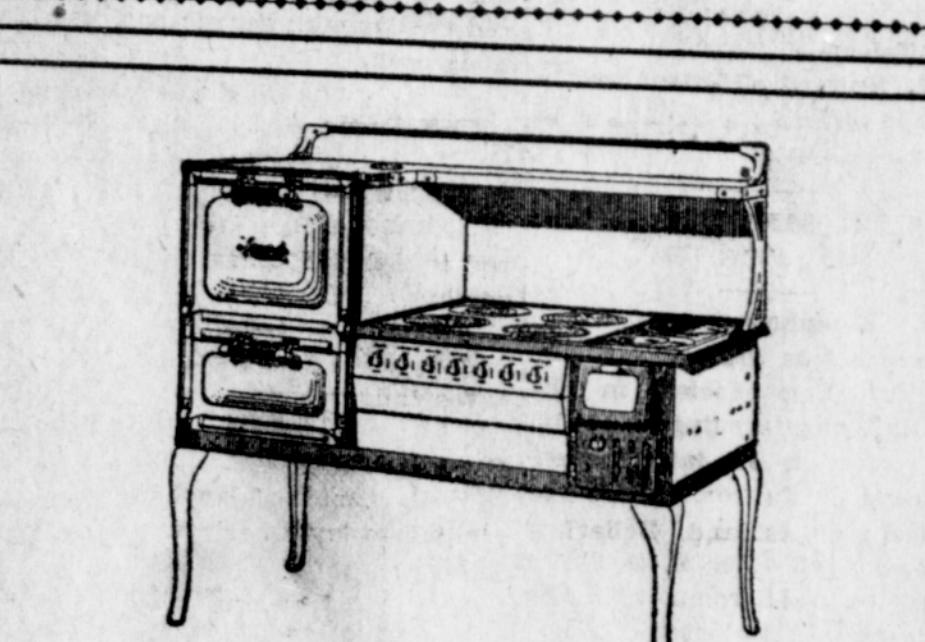

bushels of corn alone."

Milner declared that many of the birds he tagged with aluminum legmarkers, on which he has his name and a verse from the Bible, return to his farm as many as eight and nine years in succession.

"Many of my birds on their migrations are shot by hunters," he said. "and the hunters write me. I received thirty-nine letters about one duck that was shot in Louisiana. On its leg-band I had put the inscription, 'Have faith in God.'"
