London Will Construct Great Vehicle Tunnel

LONDON, Feb. 26. — Details have now been published of the scheme for building a tunnel under the Thames to connect Dartford and Purfleet, and at the same time for widening the Victoria Dock Road. The whole outlay necessary, it is estimated, will be about £6,000,000, and the work probably will take about three years. The tunnel is to be the biggest road tunnel in England and will be two and one-half miles long. There is to be space for two lines

of the largest vehicles and height enough to take a double-deck omnibus, and there is to be a footpath for pedestrians as well.
