The president will arrive in Washington on Thursday in time to rest up a little before his cabinet meeting on Friday—the first in three months.

Mr. Coolidge is much rested however. Lieut. Commander Joel T. Boone of the navy and Maj. James F. Cougal of the army have watched over the executive's condition as closely during this vacation as any pugilist's trainer watches over his protegee during the hours just before the fight.

The president has not gained much weight, in spite of his hearty appetite. His physicians have seen to it that he takes long vigorous walks almost daily. The president is moderate in every habit, by temperament and inclination and he can withstand without difficulty the most strenuous political or legislative storm that the next 12 months has to offer, according to his physicians.

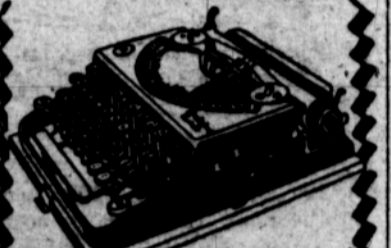

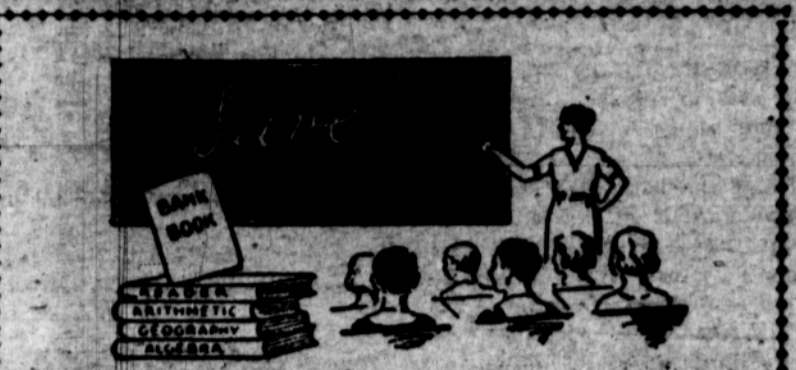
