MATTER EMPTY AS SKY ITSELF, WIZARD HOLDS

LOS ANGELES—Matter is "as empty as the sky." This is the conclusion reached by Dr. W. R. Whitney, wizard of the radio vacuum tube and a director of the General Electric Company in Schenectady, N. Y.

Speaking before the American Chemical Society, Dr. Whitney drew his generalization from the study of researches into the structure of the atom conducted by Dr. Robert A. Milliken and J. J. Thompson of the California Institute of Technology.

"Matter is electronic and celestial and the most we know about it is that it is almost entirely space," Dr. Whitney declared. "It is almost as empty as a perfect vacuum, although it usually contains a lot of energy."

"For example, a vacuum through which light is passing contains radiant energy. Apparently matter is only this same vacuum in which there are enormous numbers of positive and negative electric charges, which, however, occupy or fill only an exceedingly small portion of the space attributed to matter."

"Novel, simplifying generalizations are interesting, but dangerous, for, as some one has said, no generalization in nature is strictly true, not even this one. Nowadays we say that every gram of all matter consists of 6000,000 billion billion—600,000,000,000,000,000,000—electrons and an equal quantity of positive electricity. Then we immediately start drawing conclusions."

"Atoms of all the elements, from the smallest to the largest including the isotopes, can be constructed by orderly assemblies of positive and negative electric charges. A slight correction in the case of hydrogen interests the physicist, but need not interfere with our simple picture."

"Atoms here to look like solar and planetary systems with different groups of positive and negative charges at their centers, constituting a sort of sun or nucleus. This nucleus varies in charge or mass from element to element."

"Around this centre group are concentric systems of electrons, and the outermost groups of these determine most of the characteristic properties. For example, the hydrogen atom is one positive central charge and one negative electron in an orbit around it. This outfit, or atom, is not quite inconceivably small."

"It may be worth while to picture it, because the other elements are compounds of the same elementary components. Possibly the dimensions given are still merely the outer dimensions of more empty space."

Physicists have shot small projectiles through matter, so that we are convinced of its highly openwork structure. The projectiles were helium nuclei and electrons.

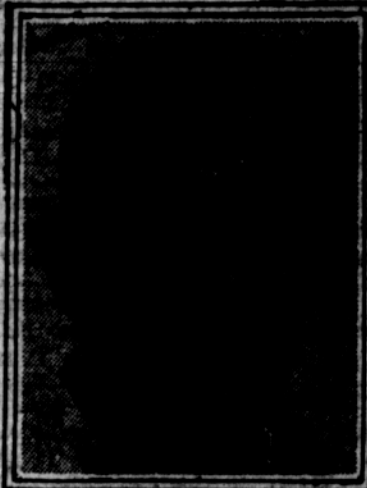
"The actual smallness of an atom is impossible to realize, but as such seems known about its dimensions that we must accept it and try to apply it."

"A molecule of water contains two atoms of hydrogen. Suppose we start with one single drop of water and let all of its hydrogen atoms appear in turn—as drops of water. How much of a rainfall must we picture in order to visualize all those hydrogen atoms of that drop? We know that the drop contains about 3x10-21 hydrogen atoms. If these were as large as raindrops they would cover the whole world with a foot of water."

WASHINGTON—Application of humanitarian methods of curing criminals in Great Britain has resulted in the closing of practically one-third of the prisons in England and Wales, according to information given Secretary of Commerce Hoover by Alfred Nuttings, of the American Consulate General's staff in London.

Reformation, rather than punishment of persons convicted of violation of the British law, has been a tremendous success, judging from figures submitted by Nuttings showing a reduction of the prison population from 167,000 in 1914 to 58,216 in 1924. Virtually every class of crime and misdemeanor convictions decreased.

"During the first few years of this century approximately 500 out of every 100,000 persons in England and Wales were sent to prison each year," Nuttings said. "Today the percentage is just over 100 for the 100,000."

Turks Are Rude to Senator King

CONSTANTINOPLE—No American visitor in the history of Constantinople has aroused more interest among the Turkish population than U. S. Senator King of Utah, who spent the Summer in a survey of Near East Relief work. Senator King is the leader of the fight in America against ratification of the peace treaty with Turkey. He comes, therefore, frankly as an enemy of the present Turkish regime.

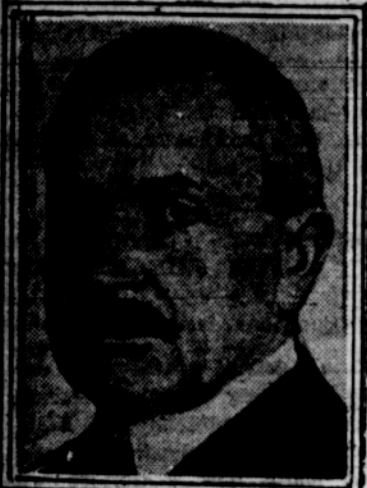

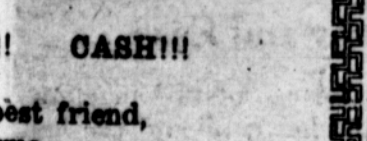
