per car. One hundred adjustments, selected at random, from each of three adjusting stations in Portland, show an average cost per car for the three stations and

200 cars of \$2.42; 200 adjustments at two stations at Salem show an average cost of \$2.19 per car. The same basis of investigation applied to one station each in the following list of cities in the state show average costs per car to be: Oregon City, \$1.54; Canby, \$1.46; Tillamook, \$2.14; Marshfield, \$2.09; Medford, \$2.44, and Grants Pass, \$1.96. State average for 1,000 cars, \$2.07.
