AMERICAN'S PEP WINS INVENTION

DARLINGTON, Eng.—American hustle has won the race for the possession of a prized British invention.

Arthur Schloerb, industrial magnate, on vacation in England, heard that the rights of a wonderful invention by Robert E. Goldsborough were in the market. The inventor has discovered a gas which, he says, will entirely eliminate the smoke nuisance in large cities, and will supply greater power than any other fuel at a far less cost. The principle of the invention is a mixture of crude oil and steam.

Hearing the news Schloerb immediately took the night train to the North of England. Goldsborough was awaiting him and the two talked business until the next morning. The concluding stages were discussed in a fast car that took them from Darlington to Newcastle. Here a contract, running into large sums, was signed with the directors of the Goldsborough Company. Two days later, Schloerb, vacation forgotten, was speeding back to the United States.

Goldsborough, who is not yet forty, has forty-seven inventions to his credit. He was the discoverer of the famous "depth charge" used against German submarines in the war, and also of the Vickers cinema gun camera.

Members of Parliament to Be Fed Hot Porridge

LONDON—Porridge, of the real Scotch variety, is going to be provided for members of Parliament in the wee small hours of the morning.

David Kirkwood, the vigorous Scotch member, has induced the House of Commons Kitchen Committee to provide "parritch" on the menu every night after 9 o'clock. Kirkwood will supervise the making of the porridge to see that it is done in the true Scotch fashion. The introduction of porridge will lean to economy, Kirkwood says, for after a six penny plate of porridge no member will have an appetite left for an expensive dinner.
