**Society**  
 U. S. IS SECOND  
 IN NUMBER OF  
 SHIPS OWNED

LONDON—Although the Uni-  
 ted States has decreased its mar-  
 ine tonnage in the last year, it  
 still continues to hold its place  
 as the second largest ship-  
 owning nation in the world,  
 according to statistics issued in  
 Lloyd's Register Book of Ship-  
 ping.

During the past year there has  
 been a net increase of 617,351  
 tons in world tonnage, and a  
 decrease of sailing tonnage by  
 248,338 tons.

The tonnage of vessels owned  
 in the United States is now  
 11,465,000, which is 575,427  
 tons less than that of a year ago.

In 1914 the United Kingdom  
 owned nearly 44-1-2 per cent of  
 the world tonnage in sailing  
 steel and iron steam tonnage; the  
 present percentage is under 33.

The United States occupies sec-  
 ond place owning nearly 20 per  
 cent of the world tonnage.

Of the 3,490 steamers of 17-  
 804,122 tons fitted for burning oil  
 fuel 720 of 4,679,695 tons are  
 registered in Great Britain and  
 Ireland and 1,855 of 3,999,000  
 are registered in the United  
 States.

Great strides in the conversion  
 of ocean-going vessels from  
 steam to oil burners are shown  
 by the Lloyd's statistics. Only  
 64 3-4 per cent of the tonnage  
 of the world's merchant marine  
 is now entirely dependent upon  
 coal, while in 1914 the per-  
 centage was nearly 89 per cent.

World tonnage has more than  
 trebled in the last decade,  
 and during that time Germany  
 has been the one maritime na-  
 tion which has suffered a de-  
 crease in its tonnage. The large-  
 est increase during the decade  
 has been made by Great Britain  
 and Ireland.

**PLAN TO BOLSTER**  
**BRITISH RAILWAYS**

LONDON—Coincident with the  
 reports of unparalleled depres-  
 sion in the shipping and coal  
 mining industries in England  
 comes the news that the British  
 railroads are in an exceedingly  
 bad way financially.

In an effort to bolster the  
 railroads up, the individual cor-  
 porations responsible have taken  
 the hitherto unprecedented step  
 of issuing an appeal for a wage  
 sacrifice by all grades, from  
 presidents and directors to loco-  
 motive drivers, firemen and sec-  
 tion gangs.

Dwindling receipts from pas-  
 senger traffic and loss of freight-  
 age are said to be mainly re-  
 sponsible for the state of affairs,  
 and a conference is to be called  
 between owners and men to talk  
 the whole situation over and  
 endeavor to arrive at a solution  
 of the trouble.
