## MANAGERIAL ROLE PUTS MARANVILLE IN BATTING SLUMP

NEW YORK—Walter "Rabbit" Maranville, the non-retillable shortstop, closed his way through thirteen years of major league baseball, but now the court jester is no more. In a moment of weakness, he allowed himself to be cajoled into accepting the managerial reins of the Chicago Cubs. Suddenly everything went black before him and the poor fellow, they say, has since wandered in a daze, wild of eye and muttering strangely in his beard. He may never be the same.

It is a sad and dejected Rabbit who is seen nowadays leading the Cubs out to their daily flop. The club in truth, is a terrible thing and Chicago fans, for no reason at all, have blamed it all on Maranville. They lay a wreath of raspberries upon his brow every time he comes to bat and the Rabbit has had no come-back.

He is a figure that has nothing in common with the cocky little ballplayer who daily invited trouble from the stands and made them like it. He accepts his abuse in silence and has let it affect his work in the field and at the plate. At one stage of the recent proceeding he went to bat forty times and got only four hits.

He never was a lousy and frequent hitter in the old days, of course, but there was danger in his bat whenever the pinches became tight. Now it seems that the punch has become silent, as in grape juice.

That, however, constitutes not the slightest reason why Maranville should be held accountable for the showing of the Cubs. He did not pick the ball club, neither did he direct its early development, if any. He was appointed manager, a month or so ago, after Bill Killefer was let out, the change being made after the major league deadline on trades had become effective. This prevented Maranville from turning out a new ball club, if he wanted to.

It is to be presumed that would have been his desire. The Cubs haven't even a practicable club, as they stand.

Playing seven games on the tiny North side grounds, they could make excellent use of players given to long hitting flies. Many of these would be turned into home runs in the Chicago park, yet the team is made up of short hitters, outside of Harriott and Brooks. The club, in brief, is utterly lacking in punch.

It could also do with more and better pitchers. Around the first of August Percy Jones, the left-hander was the only Cub pitcher who had gained better than an even break in the won and lost column. Of course, it takes something better than an ordinary pitcher to win with a club like the Cubs.

It might also be said that it takes something better than an ordinary manager.

## NOW WANT ALL SCHOOL GIRLS IN UNIFORMS

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 22.—(U. P.)—Reformers who have succeeded in getting abolition of high school secret organizations here are now coming forth with the demand that girls attending school shall be compelled to wear uniform dresses.

The Women's Business club made the demand, George W. Hug, superintendent of schools, said the board had directed him to obtain information regarding operation of dress restrictions said to exist elsewhere, particularly in some California schools.

The uniform proposed, according to Mrs. Gladys McKintire, clubwoman, would consist of a pleated wool dress, white middle, with detachable collar and cuffs, and a tie.

## GIRL DENIED RIGH TO MARRY FILIPINO

SANTA ANA, Cal., Sept. 22.—(U. P.)—The refusal of County Clerk J. M. Beck, of Orange County, to issue a marriage license to Ben Y. Chavez, Filipino, and the latter's fiancée, an American white woman, of Los Angeles, may become the subject of learned court decisions, legislative deliberations and official correspondence.

Although California law prohibits marriages between Filipinos and white Americans, L. E. Chavez, brother of Ben Y. Chavez, has laid the matter before Jaime C. De Veyra, a high ranking Government official in the islands, who, after serving as a member of the Philippine Legislature, was appointed Resident Commissioner at Washington. He has also interested members of the Philippine Assembly in the matter.
