Waldorf-Astoria

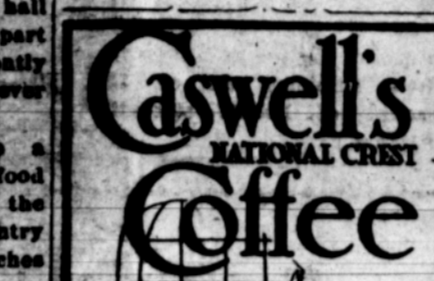
Waldorf-Astoria, famed in fiction and real life romances of "Little old New York," which recently vanished in the inexorable march of progress and prohibition, has been re-born.

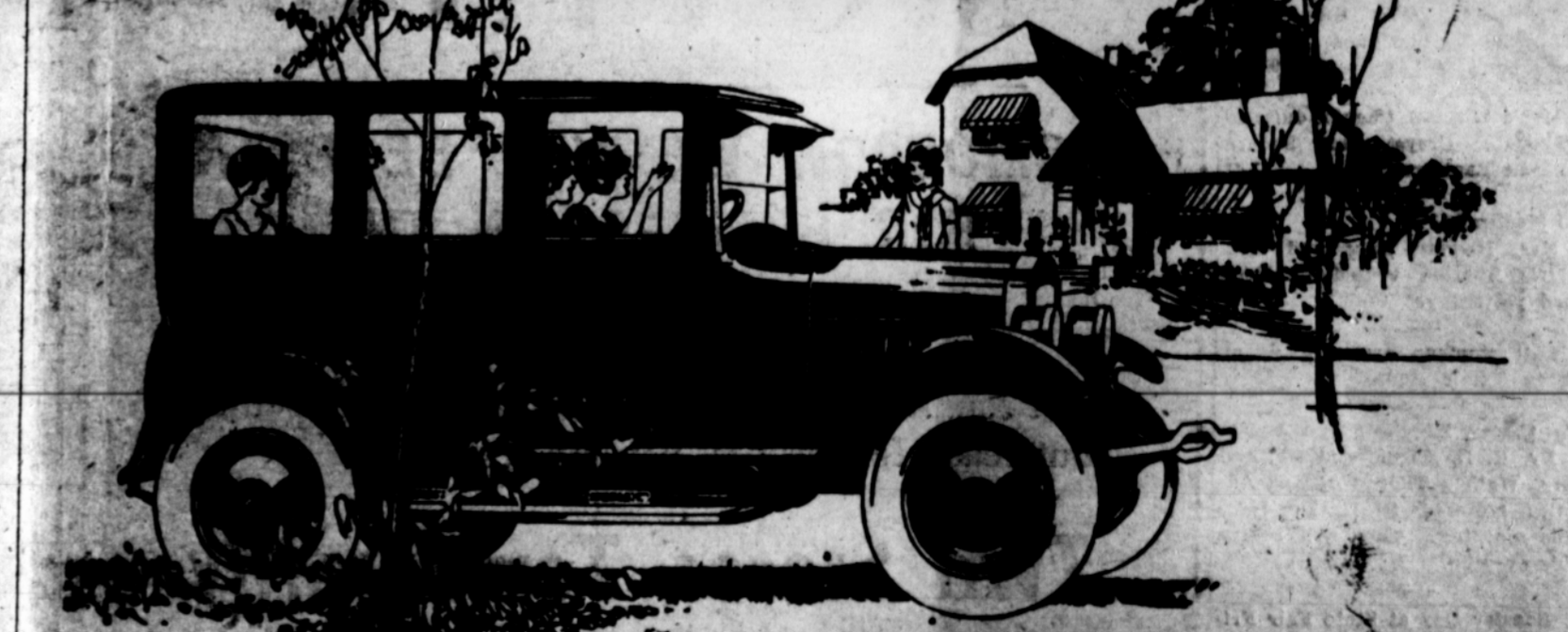
