Is Forced to Pay Heavy Import Duty On Cat's Whiskers

LONDON, Sept. 23—(U. P.)—The cat's whiskers are dutiable, under the English Customs Act. A foreign manufacturer found this out when he tried to ship into England several dozen handkerchiefs embellished in the center with a smiling needlework portrait of Felix the Cat. Each whisker had six whiskers. Each whisker was of silk. Dutiable on account of the whiskers," said the Customs Office. "You're crazy," reported the shipper, "as crazy as Felix." But the home office backed its customs official up—and the importer had to dig down into his pocket to the extent of a 2 per cent ad valorem duty on the whole shipment all on account of Felix's silk whiskers.
