**CATTLE NOW TAKING JAZZ AGE AILMENTS**

**SACRAMENTO, Cal., Sept. 24**—(U. P.)—The cow is the latest victim of the "jazz age," according to an appeal here to G. H. Hecke, head of the state department of agriculture.

Edward H. Browning, Tulare dairyman, asked Hecke what to do about a nervous complaint which had affected his prize dairy animals.

"Several of my cows have developed extreme nervousness," wrote the dairyman, "and it has had a bad effect on their production."

"Although it will probably seem unbelievable, one of the cows seems to be suffering from a regular nervous breakdown. She has gone dry, has a very evil temper, and fidgets continuously. I have been unable to find any cause for all this and would like some advice."

Director Hecke, admitting that this was the first case reported to him of cows developing "jazz age" symptoms, replied to Browning, asking a detailed statement of the symptoms, and recommending "rest and quiet."

"This is a nervous age," wrote the agricultural chief. "Your cows may have been separated from their calves too quickly, or they may have suffered from improper handling of milking machines."

**WINTER STARS NOW APPEARING UPON HORIZON**

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 24**—(U. P.)—Above the eastern horizon soon will appear brilliant stars of early winter. Pegasus takes up a position that means frosty nights. On October 7, says a bulletin of the American Association, Jupiter will be in quadrature with the Sun. That is, it will be ninety degrees east of the Sun and on the Meridian due south at sunset.

Mars is on the far side of its orbit from the earth. Its distance from the earth will decrease from 245,700,000 miles to 238,100,000 miles during October. The Big Dipper will be far over in the northwest during October. This noted group of stars never sets in the mid-latitudes of the northern hemisphere.

October star gazers will find that the constellation of Capricornus, The Sea Goat, and Aquarius, the Water-bearer, two constellations of the zodiac that contain no stars brighter than the third magnitude, have taken the place of the brilliant zodiacal group of Scorpio and Sagittarius that were conspicuous in the southern sky during the summer.

Scorpio is far over in the southwest at sunset this month. Venus, which has been visible in the western sky after sunset since late in June, passes from Libra through Scorpio in October and will be seen as Evening Star in the southwest for about two hours after sunset.

Saturn will also be seen for a short time after sunset a little to the northwest of Venus, but before October is over it will be too close to the sun to be seen in the twilight.

Jupiter is still in the constellation of Sagittarius, directly north of the little inverted milk dipper, and it will be next to Venus the most brilliant object in view in the southwestern heavens in the early evening.

Cassiopeia lies directly opposite to the Big Dipper with the north pole of the heavens about midway between the two groups, so when the Big Dipper is close to the northern horizon, Cassiopeia rises high in the heavens.

Cassiopeia lies about halfway between the curved line of three, second magnitude stars in Andromeda and the North Star. The star Alpha in Andromeda is the farthest west of these stars and in the northeastern corner of the Great Square in Pegasus. This Great Square, which is of enormous size, is one of the most distinctive configurations in the heavens and one that every star gazer should know.

The Milky Way may be traced on clear, dark evenings in October diagonally across the heavens from the northeast to the western horizon, passing from Auriga, now rising in the northeast with its beautiful, yellow, first magnitude star, Capella, through Perseus, Cassiopeia and Cepheus to Cygnus where it divides into two branches, one passing through Aquila in the west and the other to Ophiuchus on the northwestern horizon.

When the Great Square Pegasus is seen high in the eastern sky and the Northern Cross in Cygnus has passed to the west of the meridian it is a sure sign that the clear, frost nights of October are here.

Far over in the southeast now appears the brilliant Fomalhaut in the constellation of Piscis Australis. The Southern Fish, which is visible in our latitudes only for a brief period in the fall and early winter, Fomalhaut is one of the twenty brightest stars in the heavens and also a near neighbor to the solar system, its distance from the solar system being about twenty five light years or one hundred and fifty trillion miles.
