SEATTLE WINS CUP FOR FIRE PREVENTION

SEATTLE, Sept. 24—(U. P.)—Seattle's fire department made the best record in fire prevention work among cities of over 100,000 population during 1925. The big Thomas H. Ince cup for fire prevention was awarded Seattle today at the Pacific Coast Fire Chief's convention, Fresno, California, won the award for cities from fifteen to one hundred thousand, and Bend, Ore., was highest in cities under 15,000.
