**MYSTERY RACE PLANES TO ENTER U. S. MEET**

LONDON, Sept. 26. (U. P.)—Secret tests of the two mystery racing airplanes with which the British hope to recapture the Schneider Trophy Cup from America are being made.

The construction of the machines has been closely guarded and but few details regarding them have leaked out. It is understood that they are extremely diminutive in size, but powered with special Napier engines 450-500 horsepower.

Equipped with floats as seaplanes it is expected they will develop speeds well in excess of 200 miles an hour. They will be flown in the American races by Captain Henri Bert and Hubert Broad, with Bert Hinkler, famous test pilot, accompanying as reserve pilot.

Those irreverent souls who look with amazed amusement at the avalanche of "Books of Etiquette," "Perfect Behavior," "Selling Yourself" and all the rest of the personality promoters in which America seems to be engulfed—must take themselves to the Comedy Theatre and enjoy a really good laugh.

Here "The Book of Charm" a comedy by John Kirkpatrick is being presented, as well as directed, by that fine playwright Rochel Crothers. To be sure "The Book of Charms" falls from its high estate of a genuine comedy with which its excellent first act starts off—into most flagrant farce bordering on burlesque—still the laughs come quick enough to temperize the shock of incongruities. There is, too, an inept mingling of serious moments. The blend isn't subtle enough to lift this entertaining comedy into that gripping category of pathos and laughter known as pure humor.

It is uproariously funny however in its comedy scenes and there are two characterizations which stand out among the seasons fun provoking performances.

Maidel Turner who plays an oh-so-true-to-life garrulous southern woman full of politely banal conversation is a delight. Elizabeth Patterson as Mrs. Harper gives a fine picture of the harried wife and mother caught in the tolls of The Book of

Charm; stumbling through mistaken endeavors at social graces with the desire to make home delightful for her daughter.

Miss Patterson succeeds in skirting the pitfalls of the incongruous most artistically in a role with crudely balanced demands of pathos and comedy. Rudolph Klein gives a joyous bit as the book agent who sells "The Book of Charm" to a heretofore matter of fact citizenry.

Mildred MacLeod whose delicate and exquisite portrayal of the little "bound girl" in "Wild Birds" was one of last seasons memorable performances is the heroine of "The Book of Charm." The character gives her very little opportunity to do anything, but act sweet and obstinate at the same time.

The story of The Book of Charm which is filled with amusing lines, is that of a drug store clerk in love with Ida May Harper. She, like other of her associates, yearns to go to New York to have a career. She is on the very eve of going when Joe in his despondency sees a light through The Book of Charm. He too will develop a personality. And he does. It is the effect of his efforts at reconstructing Ida May's home circle which makes the comedy and eventually leads through difficulties to a happy ending.

**JAPAN EXPERIMENTING ON RADIO TELEPHONY**
