# HIGH PRICES DO NOT CURE FARM PROBLEM

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 1.—(U. P.)—The increase in the American farmers' income during the past year has utterly failed to solve the fundamental farm problem, Frank O. Lowden, former governor of Illinois, declared today in an address before the American Bankers Association Convention here.

Nothing could be further from the truth, he said, than the claim that better prices proved "that the situation upon the farm was righting itself."

Only by organization within itself for the marketing of products and for other common ends could agriculture cure the economic ills that still afflict it, regain its rightful place in a highly organized world and restore the proper balance between itself and other business activities, Lowden said.

"Though farm conditions are somewhat better than they have been in recent years," he pointed out, "they by no means assure the future of the industry. The farm problem is not solved. It will be well for us if we recognize this fact."

Asserting that agriculture is sadly out of gear with the other parts of the economic structure, Lowden said that, in an era in which progress is attained only through organization, the farmer has been the last to realize the value of organization for its own sake.

"In all other fields of commerce unrestricted, free and upon competition in the marketing of products has been gradually disappearing," he continued. "In all other industries there has been a growing tendency to stabilize prices, largely through the organization of a few great corporations which have taken the place of innumerable smaller independent units. In agriculture alone have the methods of marketing made no improvement, except as to the sale of those products which are now being marketed through cooperative associations."

In urging organization for farmers, Mr. Lowden said he did not mean that they should operate their farms through corporate management, but should work together for the solution of problems concerning the marketing of their products and the restoration of the proper relationship between the prices they receive for their products and the prices they pay for other commodities.

"Cooperative farm marketing associations are no longer an experiment," he said. "Wherever co-ops have been employed, there you will find agriculture in its best estate. The farms are better improved and are kept in a higher state of cultivation and repair. I can foresee the day when everything produced upon the farm for market will be marketed by the farmers themselves through an organization of their own creation."

General Gorgas rid humanity of one of its most devastating, age-long curses—yellow fever. Sir William J. R. Simpson, London, England, so ably summed up the lasting effect of his science when he said: "I consider that General Gorgas ranks as the greatest and most famous sanitarian of the age."

Next Saturday (October 3) is the birthday anniversary of this quiet, efficient, lovable man, who alone is credited with saving more lives than any other man in history.

"His services to mankind can never be forgotten," was the way Woodrow Wilson characterized

**MODERNISTIC DEFINITION IS GREATEST NEED**

LONDON, Sept. 25.—(U. P.)—While interest in the next steps in the Dayton evolution trial is practically a dead issue here one of the aftermaths of the publicity trial received has been a wide demand for a modernistic definition of God.

Probably the most concrete expression of these demands was voiced by the Rev. J. S. Bessant, vice president of Ripon Hall Theological College, Oxford, in a startling address before the Conference of Modern Churchmen at Oxford.

"The main obstacles to religious belief in the younger generation," he said, "are not the familiar difficulties of the Gospels such as the Virgin Birth or the physical resurrection. Young people are anxious about the much more fundamental fitness, which concern the action of God in the world today."

"They can find little or no acceptable evidence that He does anything. They are only certain that they disbelieve much of what the churches formulate appear to say or what the Bible seems to imply."

"The nature of God, his power, love and relations to the world and to individuals," said Dr. Bessant, "are the problems to which Christian theologians must give increasing attention if they are to help those to whom these vital matters are open questions."
