PREPARE FOR NEW ORLEANS CHURCH MEET

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 3.—(U. P.)—Arrangements are under way here for the accommodation of thousands of delegates and church workers expected to come here for the three weeks' convention of the Episcopal church and auxiliary bodies which begin sessions here October 7 with an open air meeting under the mammoth oaks in Audubon Park.

Warren Kearny, chairman of the arrangement committee, is in charge of the work of securing accommodations for the visitors.

Kearny has broadcasted a request that delegates or others planning to visit the city in connection with the gathering of church executives communicate with headquarters of the committee at 622 Canal-Commercial building, this city, so that arrangements can be made for their accommodation.

Many of the church leaders will be accommodated in private homes of the city which have been thrown open for the occasion. However, the hotels are expected to be filled to capacity and the committee needs a few days advance notice in order to arrange quarters for the "overflow" crowds.

The gathering is expected to be the most brilliant church assemblage this country has ever known and many subjects of vital importance to the Episcopal church are to come up for discussion and disposal during the convention.

The proposal to eliminate the word "obey" from the Episcopal marriage ritual is one of the subjects expected to arouse unusual interest in the proceedings.

The woman's auxiliary, which will hold its sessions in Trinity church, is engaged in an effort to excel previous records by raising \$1,000,000 in a single session for the carrying on of its part of the church work.

Holy communion for the House of Bishops and House of Deputies at Christ church cathedral will precede the opening ceremonies.

PREPARE TO TAKE A FALL OUT OF BILL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—(U. P.)—Colonel William Mitchell today received orders directing him to stay in Washington indefinitely until the completion of his testimony for the special aircraft inquiry board. Upon submission of this testimony in written form, Mitchell will appear before the Inspector-General of the Army, to receive any charges against him that may have been prepared upon the basis of his critical statement of the army and navy.

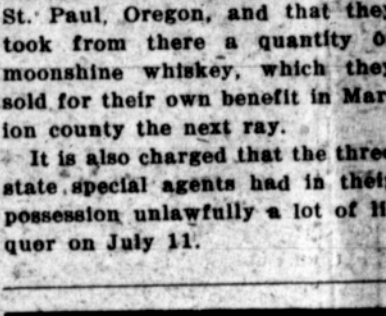

It is set forth in the indictment that in Portland on May 31 last, Christensen received \$250 from Roy Moore for protection.

On July 7, 1925, the indictment states, the three accused state officers found a large still near St. Paul, Oregon, and that they took from there a quantity of moonshine whiskey, which they sold for their own benefit in Marion county the next day.

It is also charged that the three state special agents had in their possession unlawfully a lot of liquor on July 11.
