The Fire Prevention week forum luncheon, tomorrow will be featured by a talk by Fire Chief Clinton Baughman, on methods of fire prevention.

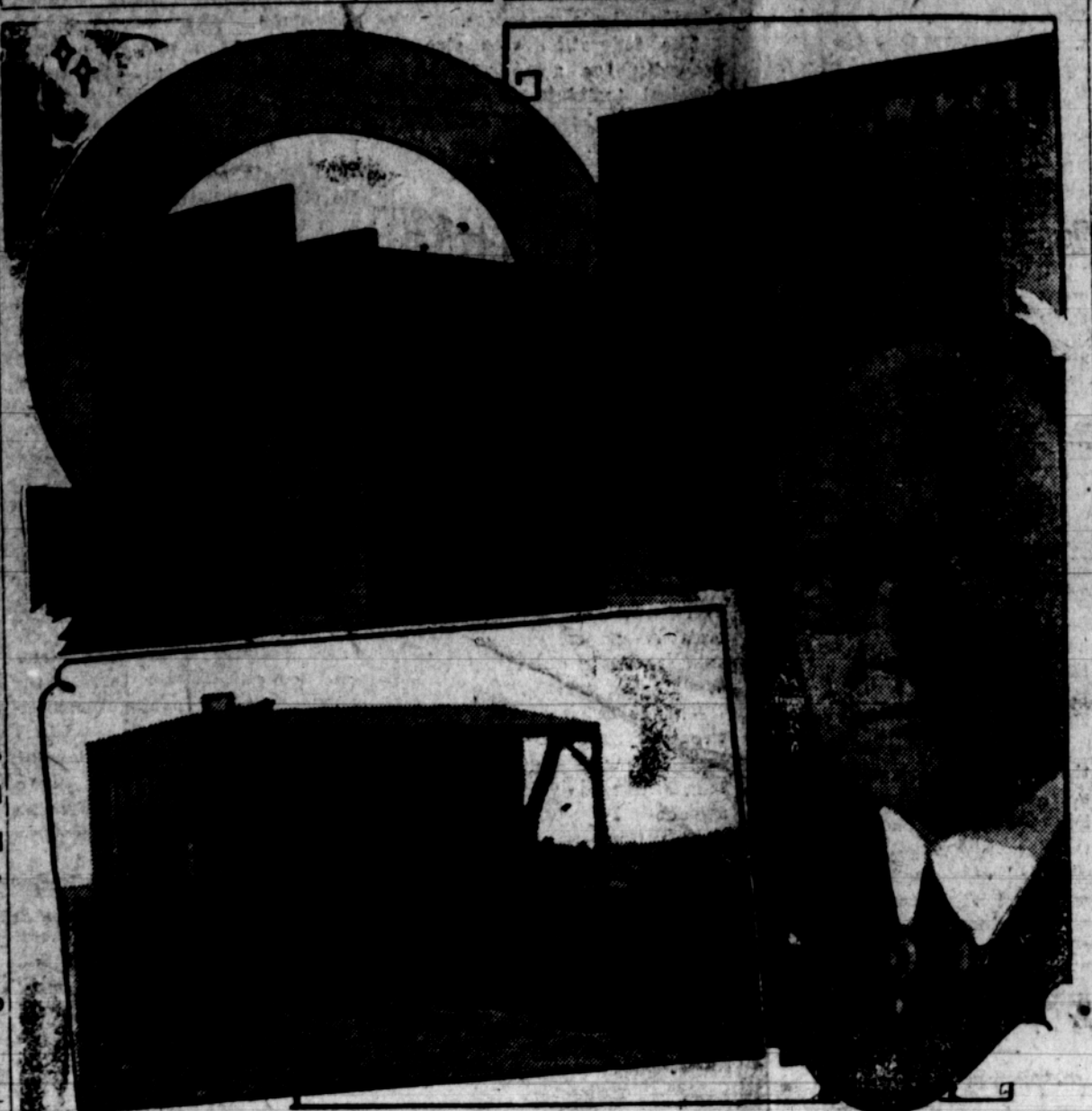
C. W. WAGNER VISITS WITH PARENTS HERE

LABOR TO STAY OUT OF POLITICS THIS YEAR

ATLANTIC CITY, Oct. 5.—The American Federation of Labor will enter the political campaigns this fall throughout the country, but will keep away from a third party movement, Harking back to the old policy of refusing to align itself with parties, and that labor's interest can be best served by freedom from party affiliations, the report of the executive board of the federation convention continued a non-partisan program, when it was made public this morning.
