The new town has been built almost as quickly as the old one, but it is much cleaner and more attractive than Old Layoye. But there isn't a derrick in sight, and the ground on which the new town stands is as yet without anything compared to the riches which underlaid Old Layoye.

Meanwhile at Old Layoye, "black gold" continues to come from the earth, but its founder is getting no share of the treasure.

The fight is over, but it has left bitter sores that may cause unrest in the oil fields for many years.

relied upon to make sure every visitor had a place to sleep.

The convention will continue until next Saturday when a new national commander to succeed James Drain will be elected and a convention city for next year selected.

The American Legion Auxiliary, the feminine counterpart of the Legion, is very much in evidence here, holding its own convention. The auxiliary was welcomed by the mayor today and in every way its convention activities correspond to those of the ladies masculine fellow veterans.

President Coolidge's address tomorrow will be broadcast by WOA-W station here. Twenty-four amplifiers have been installed around the auditorium so that the hundred thousand visitors who will be unable to attend the session while the President is making his address will be able to hear his voice. All sessions of the convention will be broadcast by JWOW.

The encampment of the regular army here for the convention was a center of interest. Among the regular units who are here to take part in the general maneuvers are the 16th observation squadron, a Martin bomber from Kelly Field, the 3rd attack group, the 17th Infantry, 1st platoon, 7th Tank Company, the 14th Cavalry, and the 1st battalion, 9th Field Artillery.
