Those in charge of the millinery department started a run on a certain kind of hat—dozens or more of which Mr. McGee had donated and soon many of the clerks and customers were wearing them.

Their stock did not last long and when all were sold, a general exchange of last year's hats was effected. So, if a well-remembered hat is atop the head some one other than the former owner, do not be surprised—it was all for the good of the cause. Every thing sold, even the decorations and a fine sum was the result. Mrs. G. O. Eubanks was financial chairman and demonstrated fine executive ability in the management of the whole affair.

The responsibility of the sale rested chiefly upon Mrs. A. H. Pracht, who is chairman of the House committee of Civic Club and who set the goal of earnings at \$200. This splendid sum was exceeded through the generosity of Mr. J. H. McGee, who donated 20 per cent of his Friday and Saturday sales in his old store to the fund.
