FOR A UNITED STATES OF EUROPE
The other day Norman Hapgood, writing for the Hearst papers, made a very good argument for a "United States of Europe."

It will be impossible for Europe, he declared, to reconstruct itself without such an association of nations as will prevent the destructive clashes of France and Germany, of Hungary and Czechoslovakia, of Poland and Russia.

It happens that for purely policy purposes, the Hearst papers, like the handful of Senate Irreconcilables, is against the League of Nations and against a world court. But writers in the Hearst papers every once in a while forget this and write what they really think.

ANOTHER VACATION FOR THE SOVIET
Again Leon Trotsky is given a highly honorable leave of absence, from Moscow, to recuperate his health in the Caucasus.

We are assured from Moscow that there is nothing seriously wrong with Trotsky, except that he needs a rest. And we can well believe it. But it is also apparent that the Soviet government of Russia needs another rest from Trotsky, and they are going to get it.

Trotsky has entirely too much energy for the stabilized Soviet government. He was a pioneer in bumpious destruction. The Soviet is now seriously trying to work out a governmental plan for Russia. The leaders of the Soviet are growing conservative. They are trying to fulfill their obvious duty of governing the state. They find Trotsky a continuous interference. They never know, when they get up in the morning, what he has done the previous night.

So they are graciously permitting him to take another leave of absence in the mountains of south Russia. If he had refused to take it, their gracious permission would have been even more insistent.

More Ships Pile On Rocks in Juan de Fuca Straits

SEATTLE, Oct. 15 — (UP)—"The graveyard of ships" in the Straits of Juan Fuca sought toll again today, when two vessels went ashore in the dense fog which blanketed the Puget Sound area.
Tugs were dispatched from Victoria early today to rescue the freighter *Shenandoah*, grounded on the rocks fifteen miles from Victoria.
The *Nippon* *Luwa* *Kajika* tugboat was seen ashore near Carmichael Point, Vancouver Island, at 8 A. M., according to radio signals picked up here, but *Yukon*, reported to have run aground again and started for home later.
