The greatest Mother of them all, MARY, THE VIRGIN

They placed her on the lowest step while they changed their travel-stained garments. Quite alone, not once turning back, the child went up the fifteen marble steps to the altar. The high priest came out and stood at the top of the steps to receive her. He kissed her and said, "Mary, in thee the Lord will show his redemption to the children of Israel." As one of the virgins in the temple, all the people loved her. She was humble and kind and modest. She was earnest and gentle, free from pride and deceit. She was as studious as she was industrious, as wise as she was chaste and pure. Every day the angels brought her food and talked with her and kept her from all evil.

When the virgins were twelve or fourteen years old the high priest ordered them to return home to be married. "But my parents," said Mary, "have given me to the Lord. I do not wish to leave the temple." The priest was perplexed. "Summon to the house of the Lord," an angel directed, "all the marriageable men of Judah. By a sign the husband of Mary shall be chosen." With the rest came a humble carpenter named Joseph. And behold! a dazzling white dove came out of his rod, lighted on the carpenter's head and flew toward heaven: So Mary and Joseph were betrothed, and the angel Gabriel visited her and greeted her: "Hail, Mary! The Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou among women." Thus the angel's words "Ave Maria" became the prayers and the songs of the Churches of Christendom. Mary, as if inspired, broke out in poetry of praise and joy and happy thanksgiving: "My soul doth magnify the Lord And my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Savior." Thus her words became "The Magnificat" whether in Latin or in English. Mary and Joseph were married, but her holy child was not to be born in Nazareth. The Roman Emperor who ruled over Palestine ordered all the people to go to their native towns to be enrolled for the new tax records. Belonging to the family of David, Joseph must go to his town of Bethlehem, and Mary with him. There, in a stable, Jesus was born. Year by year Mary saw her son grow in body and spirit filled with wisdom, the Grace of God upon Him. He was a sacred charge, hers for a short while, to be trained for a great work. So carefully educated a mother, you may be sure, would teach her son the books of the law and the prophets. Then she must separate from him. The disciples told Mary of their last supper with her son. She learned of the tragic scene when the Roman soldiers arrested him. She knew the mockery of the trials before high priest, Pontius Pilot and Herod. In her ears dinned the mad shouts of the people, "Give us not this man, but Barabbas!" Barabbas who was guilty of murder. "Crucify him!" cried the fickle crowd. When she heard that the sentence was confirmed, Mary's heart was well nigh broken; yet her mother love never failed. All the way to Calvary she followed. With sublime faith and fortitude she stood by the cross to the end; she waited in faith and hope till there came the glorious news that Jesus had risen from the dead and his reign on earth had begun.
