## FEDERAL ARCH FOR HEALTH IS ADVOCATED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17—(UP)—A new federal department of education or a department of education and health—is now under consideration by the Administration, James A. Tobey, Director of the Institute for Government Research said today.

The average length of life in this country would probably be increased from its present amount of 58 years in the next quarter of a century if Federal health leadership under central direction is established," Tobey said.

Thirty-seven different government bureaus are now undertaking public health activities. All the major administrative units of the government are concerning themselves with this subject and in doing the work are acting more or less independently.

While only about one half of one percent of the total annual Federal Budget is allotted to health education work three times that amount is being spent by Uncle Sam for medical relief. A more effective operation of preventive activities would result in economy in administering curative measures in the future.

Tobey said he is now making a complete survey for all Federal health work and formulating plans for a centralized Health and Education Department.

## AIRCRAFT BOARD INQUIRY FINISHED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17—(U. P.)—The air craft inquiry is over and the report for the guidance of the President is now being prepared. Open hearings were concluded last night by the special air board, after a month of sittings.

A brief executive session was held today, to map out a program for drafting of a report, and then the board scattered to study the voluminous record. The board members will devote a week to individual study, and then will assemble to write the report.

The next step in the aircraft controversy will be the court department action on the court martial of Colonel William Mitchell, whose criticism and charges precipitated the inquiry just concluded.

GENOA, Switzerland, Oct. 17—(UP)—Twelve persons were killed and twenty injured when freight and passenger trains on the Genoa-Milan line collided today. It was the second major railroad accident in Italy within a week.

## MAYOR SAVES PARIS BEAUTY PRIZE MONEY

PARIS, Oct. 17—(U. P.)—The Queen at last has her castle. A year ago, Mlle. Suzanne Tissier, one of a family of ten children was chosen by the mayor of her arrondissement as "Queen" of her quarter and consequently, entitled to a purse of 1,350 francs.

But there was a string attached to the gift. Its winner must marry within a year or give up the purse. Mlle. Suzanne was engaged when elevated to "royalty" and the 1,350 francs would have bought the bedroom set she had set her heart upon. But for eleven months and three weeks, Mlle. Suzanne and her chosen young man hunted in vain for an apartment, followed funerals and did everything that Parisians have learned to do without success. The prize was slipping away when "Queen" Suzanne went to see the Mayor.

## WALKER WONT GIVE SHADE A RETURN BOUT

NEW YORK, Oct. 17—(UP)—"You go and bet all the real estate in Florida that it will take Dave Shade just as long to get another fight with Mickey Walker as it did to get the first one—if he ever does get another one," an intimate friend of Jack Kearns, Walker's manager, said a few days ago.

It took Shade two years to get into the ring with Walker and reaped the maximum of official pressure from the New York boxing commission to defend his welterweight title against the California challenger and it does not require information from such a reliable source to predict that Shade never will get a return bout.

Walker is too careful and his manager is too chrewd to take another chance with Shade after the narrow escape they had from losing the only valuable title now on the market.

Walker made a whirlwind finish in that fight and many good judges, such as William Maldoon, veteran boxing commissioner, thought that Shade won.

Shade's failure to win the championship was due primarily to the decision of the referee and one of the judges that Walker had won, but some smart boxing men blame Leo Flynn, Shade's manager, for allowing Walker to take the fight away from Shade in the fifteenth round.

Several reliable fans, who were sitting in the front row near Shade's corner, said they heard Flynn tell Shade before the bell for the fifteenth round to go out and play safe and take no chances.

"You've got the decision in the bag now," Flynn was reported to have said. "Don't take any chances now."

Shade played safe and took no chances from all appearances, and Walker came out with a desperate last-minute attack, so furious that it must have blotted out the recollection of the earlier rounds in the minds of the two officials, although one of the judges voted for Shade.

The arguments about the decision got no place, however, unless those who thought or wrote that Shade was entitled to the decision get some satisfaction out of the discussion to vindicate their own judgment.

The writer picked Walker to win the fight and yet he thought that Shade won the fight by a score of at least ten to five, if points can be scored that way.
