and lowering of corporation taxes. In the interest of speed, the length of the present hearing has been cut to ten days. Today and tomorrow will be devoted to hearing the Treasury side of the story and certain tax experts who have signified their intention of testifying.

The question of individual income taxes will be taken up October 21; corporation income taxes October 22; estate and gift taxes October 23; and miscellaneous taxes October 24, and the Board of Tax Appeals and General Administrative features, October 27 and 28 and miscellaneous witnesses will be heard October 29.

Then the committee will go into executive session with its experts and begin drawing up the bill.

The hearings are being cut shorter this year than ever before. In order to prevent duplication of arguments and suggestions, Green has ruled that persons having the same problem to present must select only one of their number to go on the stand.

INVENTIONS ARE SEARCHING FOR DEATH RAYS

LONDON, Oct. 13—(T. P.)—Stuck away in amateur laboratories here and throughout Europe, enthusiasts are busy trying to perfect a "Death Ray" that will actually kill.

One such ray "invented" here some time back killed a dog. Another killed a cow. Both manifestations however failed to bring wealth and fame to the respective inventors, because it was proved that the animals died from other causes than the ray.

In the case of the dog the inventor prepared his Death Ray which involved a considerable amount of power. He arranged the source of his ray near the focus of a huge concave reflecting mirror. At a distance of 20 feet the dog was held in chains, so that the energy of the Death Ray was concentrated on him.

After about an hour—the dog was dead, baked to death in the terrific glow of the search light.

The cow, investigators ascertained later was killed dead enough, but not from the mysterious "Death Ray."

The inventor had rigged up secret electric wires and electrocuted the creature by merely pressing a hidden button.

Both these episodes go hand in hand with the famous case of a continental inventor who claimed to have discovered a ray to be used for blowing up a battleship.

A claim of this nature could not be completely ignored by the British Admiralty to whom the suggestion was made. The inventor was offered a test and the Admiralty provided a ship

to be destroyed. The offered test apparently proved too severe, for it was never carried out, and the inventor quietly disappeared from this country.

He next tried to give some form of demonstration abroad. The Admiral in charge of the tests there imposed similar severe conditions, with promise of great reward if successful, but penalties if unsuccessful. Again the inventor disappeared.
