ARCTIC CABOOSE IS ERIE EXHIBIT
SUSQUEHANNA, Pa., Oct. 24 (U. P.)—An old time Erie Railroad caboose that has been in Arctic regions for four years sits on a siding alongside the Erie station here. On it is the following inscription:
"This caboose was loaned Lieutenant Perry by the Erie Railroad and went on his expedition in 1899; was used as a deckhouse on the ship. Windward, and east altitude was 70 degrees north and it is the only railroad car ever sent to the Arctic regions."
While Perry's ship was being fitted out alongside the Erie dock in New York harbor, Lieutenant Perry caught sight of the caboose and asked for the loan of it for his trip. It was in the polar regions for four years and recently the railroad had it returned to be used as an exhibit.

STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON — President Coolidge's two leading cabinet members unquestionably are Secretary of the Treasury Mellon and Secretary of Commerce Hoover.
This isn't to say that the others aren't good men in their places, but that Mellon and Hoover are more absolute in their respective departments than any of the rest and that Hoover has more to do in the shaping of more different policies than any other single individual under the national chief executive.

Secretary of State Kellogg takes his orders from the White House and doesn't look down on suggestions from Senator Borah, chairman of the upper house Foreign Relations Committee. Secretary of War Weeks had a pretty free hand, and so, perhaps will Secretary Davis, but the War Department head is distinctly tied down by presidential ideas of economy.
Secretary of the Navy Wilbur not only is financially cramped in style, but has to be careful how he expresses himself, as witness the calling down he got from the White House a year and a half ago for speeches he made in California.
Postmaster General New's limitations are mainly financial, but, he too, has to conform in this respect.
Attorney General Sargent and Secretary of Agriculture Jardine were hand-picked to develop plans chosen in advance by the administration.
Secretary of the Interior Work is dependent on the president for protection from political interests which are trying to get his scalp. Secretary of Labor Davis—two Davis' in the cabinet now—isn't an aggressive department head anyway.

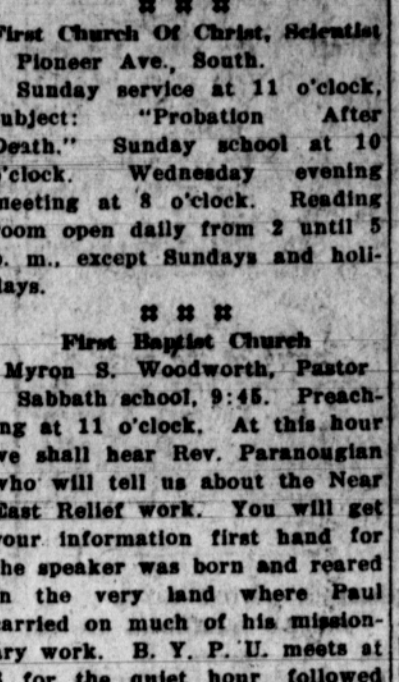
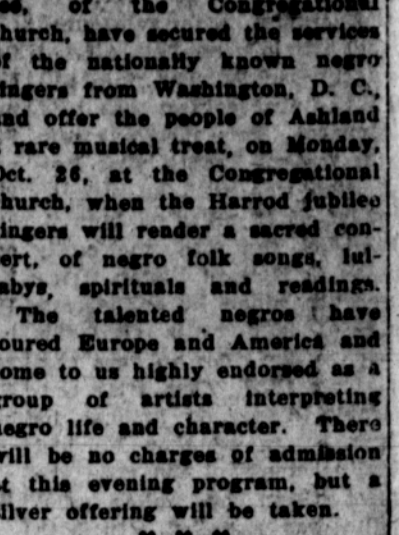

HIGHWAY WORK IN KLAMATH CONTINUES
YREKA, Oct. 23—With smiling skies in the rugged regions of the Salmon and lower Klamath rivers, road work by federal agencies may progress until far into December, instead of terminating by November 1, as in recent years, when snow and rain blocked further activities.
It was announced this week that the federal bureau of public works has allocated \$50,000 for improvement of the road from Happy Camp to Orleans on the Klamath river and from Somes Bar to Forks of Salmon on the Salmon river. This money will be expended in cutting off sharp curves on the highways, graveling the roadways and building drains. Men will probably continue to work in this area all winter.
Two of the 14 miles of road between Sawyers Bar and Ceilville have been completed by the federal forest service, according to Fred D. Douthitt, supervisor for the Klamath National Forest. This work is progressing steadily.
Two new public highways were recently approved by the Slaktyou board of supervisors, the reports of the viewers adopted and the work of grading and maintaining the roads has commenced. The Tule Lake road to the Oregon line and the road between Indian creek and the Gray Eagle mine are Slaktyou's new arteries.

Klamath Falls — New Grizzle two-story main street building will cost \$30,000.

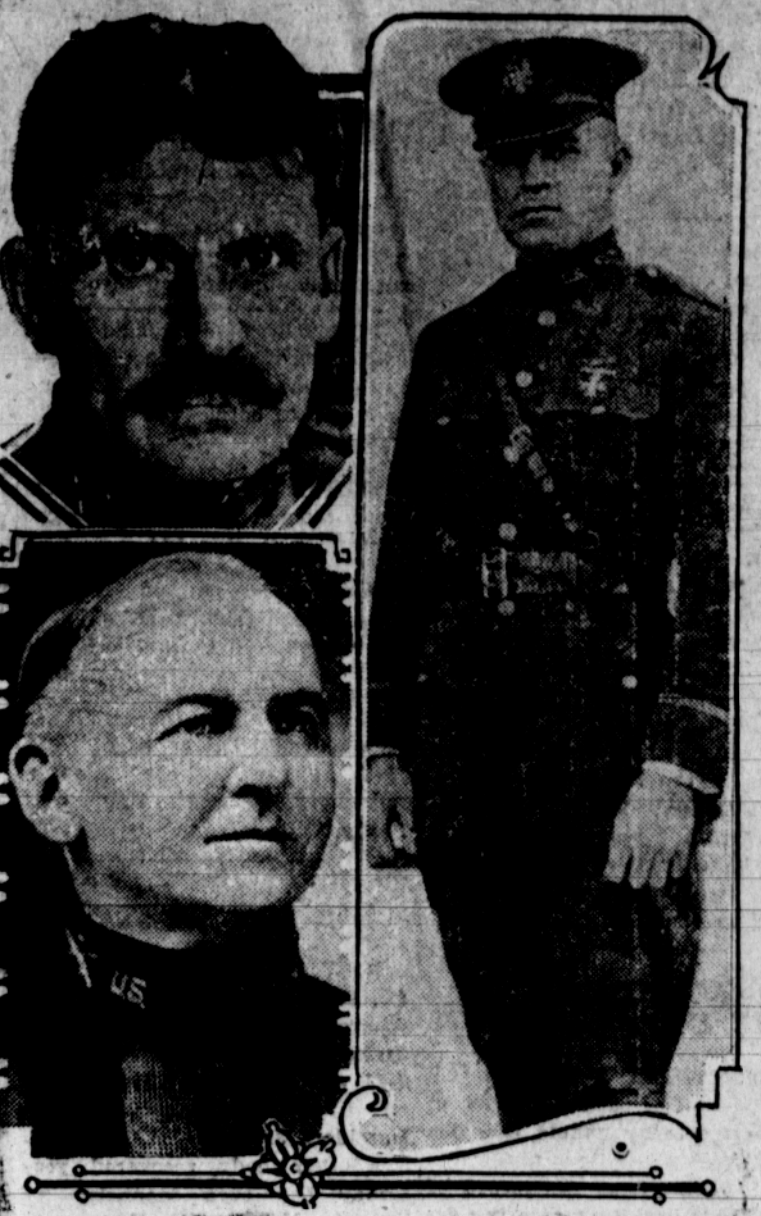
