On way is to levy more taxes. Since no one wants

more taxes, this way is not seriously urged.

A second way is to inflate the currency. That is, to issue enough more paper money to cover the shortage letween income and outgo. This is the proposal of the inance minister, Caillaux, with the approval of the pre-Taier and the rest of the cabinet.

The third way is to confiscate the property of those vho, some people think, have more than their share. "his is the "capital levy." It is advocated by the socialists and other extreme radicals. They urge it not as a finance, but as a revolutionary measure. They are not to much concerned with balancing the budget, as they are with seizing opportunity of the necessity for balancing the budget by putting into effect a socialist effort at

But France is not pending more than her income each year to increase her apital. Her unholy expenditures are to carry on curent costs.

The obvious way for France to meet the situation would be by none of these three ways, but by a fourth. This legitimate way would be by cutting current ex-

penses to a point within her income. But no party in France supports such a move. Either they do not want to, or they are afraid to.

Either way, it is bad for France.

NEA Service Writer would cause terrific temporary confusion, treasury officials generally agree that the discovery of a cheap method of transmuting base metal into gold would not for very long continue to cripple the currency system of

Several scientists claim actually to have produced synthetic gold, though at a cost greater ket value. Whether or not these claims are well fouded, most scientific men of today admit their possibility and that the process might conceivably be so cheapened as to rob gold of its monetary utility.


This worries the treasury folk very little, even stretching credulity so far as to conmetal, like platinum, would be substituted for gold—that might be produced artifically, too.

Bartering goods would be extremely inconvenient. A system of tokens representing labor performed is one suggestion.

But by far a mapority of the treasury people think the best plan would be to place a kind of mortgage on the nation's natural resources and base paper money ssues on that, which would give them an even truer value than issues based on a gold reserve.
