huskies bringing the desired results. The fast tiring Ashland defense at times held the Pelicans, but after the inevitable punt out of danger, back the Klamath outfit would come, until, toward the end of the quarter, Klamath was no longer to be stopped, and over went the third touchdown. Hall also kicked goal on this, making the score 20-0.

Ashland's lone tally came in the final period. Backed up, on his own 20 yard line, Tilton, Ashland quarter pulled a quick kick. The Klamath safety fumbled, and Gonnell, Ashland half scooped up the ball and ran 40 yards before he was downed on the Klamath five yard line. Three plunges were required

before Gillette went over. Tilton kicked goal and forty seconds later the game ended.

Han Cotter, diminutive center was in every play, and had he carried around 15 pounds more beef, there might have been a different story to tell. Beeson and Katsar at ends also played nice football, and stopped every play going around their positions, forcing the Klamath outfit to depend upon line plunges for yardage. Both men also got down under punts nicely.

Gonnell was a consistent ground gainer in the backfield, while Gande and Tilton showed up well on the defense.

Next Friday, the Ashland outfit entertains the Roseburg high eleven on the local field.

officer on hand to sign for rations.

"Then a battalion raid was ordered, and I got mine. "It was on August 18, 1916. Somehow the Germans had been tipped off as to what we were to do.

"They were all ready and waiting for us—equipped us with machine guns, and I lost 192 men in just three minutes.

"I was shot down, and a German rushed at me with his bayonet. He tried to stick it through me as I was lying there. I pulled my leg up for protection, and he ran the bayonet through it.

"Then he tried to pull it out so he could finish the job, so I wiggled around so he couldn't get it loose.

"So he pulled the trigger. "After that I wasn't good for much. I was invalided home to the states, and sent to Sparta, S. C.

"Then I was brought to Wash-

ington. They started operating on me, and they've been chopping away ever since."

The trouble is "osteomyelitis," in medical parlance.

"In plain English," explains Williams, "that means rotting of the marrow of the bones. A section of bone rots, and they cut it away. Then another section rots, and they have to cut some more. There doesn't seem to be any end of it."

Williams would rather talk of his son's heroism than of his own.

"He was only 13 years old when war was declared, but he was big for his age, and somehow or other he managed to get into the navy," the shattered father said.

"Of course it was just his luck to be on the Jacob Jones.

"His right arm and the right side of his chest were torn off by a piece of shell, and he floated around in the water on a spar. Finally he was washed up on the Irish coast and was rescued.

"But he's totally disabled for the rest of his life."

A regular army officer, upon discharge or retirement, gets three-quarters pay for the rest of his life.

But an "emergency" officer gets nothing, save such compensation as the Veteran's Bureau allows.

Efforts to induce Congress to rectify this discrimination all have met with failure.

But Williams still smiles and

is hopeful.

"Maybe I'll get out of here sometime, and then I hope I can find a job somewhere," he remarks.

"I'll need one, because I still have a wife to support. She's living in Washington now.

"Getting work, though, is going to be rather hard, I guess."

Williams' wife aged a good deal. Williams is 57. He looks 60 and more.

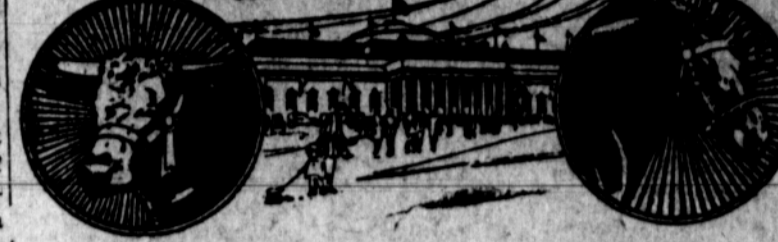
