Ashland Man Fined in Medford Court on Speed Charge

MEDFORD, Oct. 28—"I won't appear in court," declared Jack Owen of Ashland when he was arrested Sunday by State Traffic Officer J. J. McMahon for speeding on the Pacific highway south of this city.

"Well, drive to Medford and we'll see," answered that official. Arriving here the officer suggested that the car be held in a bond for Owen's appearance in court. Upon Owen's assertion that the car did not belong to him and that he had no money for a bond, it was McMahon's only alternative to put him in the city jail, where he spent Sunday night and part of yesterday morning.

Of the three possible charges of reckless driving, having, it is alleged, passed 19 cars in a short distance while driving with one hand, driving with no operators' license and speeding, the latter was only preferred against him.

He was represented by Attorney G. M. Roberts in Judge Taylor's court yesterday morning, and after a short conference with his counsel, Owen pleaded guilty and was fined \$10, and in addition received a mild rebuke from the court for driving with one hand on a crowded highway.

TEAMS WHICH ARE OPPOSITE PLAY HARDEST

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—(U.P.)—There is an axiom in the business of promoting boxing matches—"If you want a wow, put an Irishman and a Jew in a ring together."

The theory being, probably much the same as that which finds a left handed batter slugging his best against a right hander and vice versa.

Football, too, offers an opportunity for "opposites" to meet each other. The fastest, hardest fought games of the year are usually found when two teams employing completely different modes of attack are lined up against each other and let loose.

There are, generally speaking, two varieties of gridiron offensive. One of these is fooling the enemy regarding the point of attack, drawing him out of position and then shooting the runner. This is football depending upon brains and cunning.

The other is getting together as many interferences as possible and quickly rushing them, to the line of scrimmage with a certain job allotted to each man. This is the method of power and brawn.

Both of these call for speed, but the first requires speed only from the man carrying the ball.

Get a pair of top-notch clewens which employ these divergent methods of attack fairly consistently and you have a battle that will thrill you for many a moon in retrospect.

"Oh" Dobbie, the gloomy coach of the Cornell team, is a master at the deceptive method. Scarcely a season goes by in which he does not originate at least one play that will be good for 20 or 30 yards the first time it is used.

Much of the sensational Eddie Kaw's success was attributed to off-tackle slants made when the opposing team was prepared for a sweeping end run.

Knut Rockne, who guides the destinies of Notre Dame football, is able to develop better interference for his backs than probably any other coach.
