#### VICTORY FOR CANADA'S FARM BLOC

The general election in Canada has resulted in what may amount to a deadlock. The Liberal party is in power and called the election. The Conservative party has won a plurality of votes in the lower house of parliament. That vould apparently be called a "Conservative victory" and rould result, under the Canadian system, in displacement of the Liberal cabinet by a Conservative administraion. But no such conclusion, under the responsible cabia et system is certain to follow. For an administration is turned out only on an adverse vote in parliament, Such in adverse vote may be had. It may not.

The key to the situation in Canada, as in the United i tates, is the "farm bloc." It is not called that, in Canda. 'There it is "the Progressive Party." In the United States the farm bloc is not a party. That is because we have fixed government, not responsible government. With s the administration, that is President Coolidge, is not esponsible to any one, once elected. As long as he keeps · lear of positive impeachment proceedings, the President can do virtually whatever he pleases. So we nearly alvays line up on a straight "for" or "against" basis. In the election last week the Progressives seem to have elected about 25 votes, enough to hold the balance of power, since the Conservatives have about 120 votes and the Liberals about a hundred. ### 4.4 BEER FAILURE IN ONTARIO

The failure of the 4.4 per cent beer program in the province of Ontario, Canada, points once more to the fact that playing with the question of prohibition will not further any purpose to quibble about whether a certain per cent of liquor is intoxicating or not. The proposals in the United States to amend the Volstead act to permit of 5 per cent beer, or 2 3-4 per cent, instead of the ent 1-2 of 1 per cent, are merely anti-prohibition redges. There is no question that 1-2 of 1 per cent beer a not intoxicating. It may be debatable as to whether 3.4 per cent is intoxicating or not. But the difference "kick" between 1-2 and 2 3-4 is not enough to be atractive to those who want to drink beer. The most of sem are as willing to drink honest to goodness nearcear as they are the debatable stuff. And anything that 5 per cent or higher is unquestionably intoxicating.

So the issue mght as well be fought out. It is clear: Is it within the constitution power of the United ates, to prevent the use of intoxicants, and if so, it is
