**Great Mothers of the World**

**FRANCES GASCOYNE**—Mother of Robert, Lord Salisbury

The death of his mother at ten years of age, was an irreplaceable loss to this great British peer as was the death of Nancy Hanks to Abraham Lincoln. And like Nancy Hanks, Frances, Lady Salisbury, was a leading influence upon her son. Her was his "bosom friend" mentioned by the "lad" being sent to school, and by the strenuous system of education which then prevailed in boys' schools in England, which Lord Salisbury in later life did as much toward abolishing as did Charles Dickens. The young Robert was finally taken from school and put under the charge of the Rev. Henry Lytton—the author of the well known hymn, "Abide with me," from whom he received kindness and sympathetic treatment.

Miss Gascoyne was the only child of Bamber Gascoyne of Chidwell, a stock largely derived from the citizen class. Sir Crisp Gascoyne, the founder of her family's fortune, was one of the four Lord Mayors from whom her son often boasted descent. Her health was frail, which rendered impossible any assertion in public of her rare intelligence and great personal charm. Like Nancy Hanks she was possessed of deep religious faith, of strong feelings and warm enthusiasms—the latter traits held sensibly in leash; for in her delicate reserve and unobtrusive, unassuming dignity of manner, she satisfied the ideal of a great lady. She gathered round her the finer intellects among the young men of the Great Britain of her day. Lord Beaconsfield (Disraeli) gratefully recalled her kindness to him at the outset of his career. Mr. Gladstone often spoke to the same effect; indeed there was a peculiar tenderness in his recollection of her. In the last weeks of his life he referred to her in a touching note to the later Lady Salisbury congratulating her upon her husband's escape from a carriage accident. After words of sympathy he prays the blessings of God on both and reminds her, "You are aware that I still feel my debt of early gratitude to his mother."

This great man did not enjoy being stewed and bored at dinner parties. He refused to devote himself to the law and wrote to his father thus of the professions: "A clergyman or a statesman or a doctor, are as such useful men. Their professions do good. But the barrister is at best but a tolerated evil. He derives his living from the fact that the law is unalterable; and in proportion as modern legislation succeeds in making it accessible and simple, he will disappear. The bar not only does no good, but is a public nuisance—though perhaps for the present inevitable. I conclude therefore that legal eminence is scarcely worth the having"—all of which reminds one of the gruesome legend of haunted Littlecote Hall, referred to by Sir Walter Scott in "Rokeby" and told by Irving in his notebook, thus: An old midwife was hurriedly summoned by a stranger to assist at the confinement of a lady of high degree. A rich reward was promised, but the woman had to consent to be blindfolded. The cunning dame counted, however, the number of steps leading up to the castle, and cut out a piece of the cover of the bed on which the lady lay. A male child was born, and this so infuriated the stranger that he seized the infant and flung it into the fire. The next day the midwife was able to identify Littlecote House (an old feudal hall in Berkshire) as the scene of the murder, and the infant's uncle, Darrell as the criminal. Darrell was tried before Judge . . . who was well known to be venal. As Darrell had no children he promised to make the judge his heir if he acquitted him. The hall has continued in the family of the Judge and is still owned by them. From the time of his acquittal Darrell always saw the ghost of his sister and her child. If he opened a window they were there. If he was riding in the hunt and about to leap a stile his sister and her child stood on the other side and forbade him. He told her to stand out of the way or he would ride over them; he tried to leap, but the horse saw the ghost, reared, recoiled, threw him and broke his neck.
